The State of the Society - Where SGS is, and where we're heading

During the 2003 SGS Reunion, I gave a presentation on the state of SGS. This year, I decided to publish my evaluation of the state of the society in this newsletter so the membership can read it.

When I assumed the SGS presidency in 2002, the SGS Board of Directors, at my recommendation, set two overarching goals: (1) increase membership and (2) improve volunteerism.


Figure 1 shows the membership trend since 2002. Notice that at the end of each year, we lose many members. So far, we've been able to replace them over the ensuing months so

that in November of 2005 we had 400 members. This is the highest number since I've been tracking membership. The membership chairman has worked diligently to retain members, including sending each member who has not paid their dues a letter encouraging them to do so. However, if they aren't paid by February of the following year, they are dropped from our membership roles. There are 30 societies, libraries, etc. on the newsletter mailing list in addition to our active members.

So, we are making progress on achieving overarching goal number one, but I feel we can do better. How can you help? Consider purchasing a membership for your grown children (remember, membership is available for 1, 2, 3, 5 years or for LIFE). Or, consider purchasing a membership for your county or state genealogical society or research library.

Overarching goal number two, increasing volunteerism, has been more heartening for me. Here are several reasons why!

1. Dan Seelye started a Seeley website while he was SGS president. He requested someone relieve him of maintaining a Seeley website. **Chris and Jerry Havnar** stepped up to the plate and hit a homerun! I visit the



website at least weekly and I'm surprised at the new things the Havnars keep adding. If you have access to the internet, I encourage you to visit www.seeley-society.net. If you are a Seeley descendant, I think you'll be as proud of this family website as I am.

President's Report

One of the most important jobs I have as your president is to appoint a nominating committee to select a new slate of officers for the next two-year term. SGS LIFE Member Veronica Seeley Newell has agreed to accept and chair this important committee. Additional volunteers yet to be named will assist Veronica as committee members. If you are interested in serving on the SGS Board of Directors please contact Veronica at vanewell2005@yahoo.com. The composition of the executive board, i.e., the nine elected positions on the SGS Board of Directors, is listed in the SGS by-laws, article III. The board has agreed that future directors must have e-mail capability. I hope this isn't a great hardship for members who want to serve but it seems most



members already have e-mail. I have found that communicating via e-mail is more effective, less time consuming, more timely, and cheaper than using U.S. mail and, in some cases, even the telephone.

I recommend all SGS members retain the November 2005 SGS Newsletter since it contains the approved SGS Constitution and By-Laws. By an affirmative vote at the last membership meeting, future changes to the constitution and by-laws will normally be made by amendment rather than reprinting. The membership chairman plans to provide each new member with a copy of the C&BLs.

I did not give a "State of the Society" presentation at the 2005 SGS Reunion in Abilene since we had a full agenda. My thoughts on how we are doing are included in a separate article in this newsletter.

I strongly encourage members to use the <u>SGS numbers</u> assigned to the first eight generations of the descendants of immigrants Robert and Obadiah Seeley in the three SGS publications. If you are submitting a query or discussing ancestors with other members or researchers, the use of the assigned SGS number (when you know it) is of enormous value and saves us all a lot of time.

If you haven't already done so, please send your Seeley ancestor information to SGS Ancestor File Index Coordinator John Seely. John includes your information in his database, and then forwards the information to the Seelye Research Center in Abilene, Ks. for retention. John has told me to encourage you to keep sending him your data until he tells us to stop. Nearly 700 Seeley descendants (of various spelling) have submitted data to John. His database is on the SGS CD-ROM along with other compilations and research reports. John is in the process of updating his database from the 2003 version.

I am wrestling with deciding on what research objectives we should pursue with SGS funding. I welcome your ideas. See the reunion souvenir book for an update on our knowledge of immigrants Robert and Obadiah Seeley's ancestry.

As I write this, we have 34 orders for the Abilene reunion souvenir book. We plan to print a few extra for those who haven't ordered a copy yet. If you would like one, send me a check for \$25, payable to SGS. See page 15 for my address. There will only be one printing and they'll be sold on a first come, first served basis.

There will be a meeting of the SGS board of directors on May 19, 2005 at the Seelye Research Center in Abilene, Ks. If you have issues you would like the board to address, please send them to me at jrseeley@adelphia.net. A summary of the board's actions will appear in the August 2006 newsletter.

Kathie Olsen has worked hard since the reunion putting together changes to the three SGS publications. This newsletter contains an article on changes that have been previously published. This newsletter also contains a new Change # 6 to the Sixth Generation Families Book. I hope you will take the opportunity to relay your gratitude to Kathie Olsen for all the work she has done and continues to do to keep the three SGS publications updated with your recommended changes.

- 2. Paul Taylor took over as newsletter editor from the outstanding job done by Ray Hall. Paul is not a guy with lots of time on his hands. He works full time and does a lot of travel with his job. As I write this, he has just completed the reunion souvenir book. Ray improved the newsletter when he took that job. I think Ray agrees that Paul has taken the newsletter to another, higher level. I can't thank Paul enough for the long, professional hours he spends on behalf of SGS.
- **3. Wesley Waring** organized the initial Obadiah DNA Test Project that discovered (1) immigrants Robert and Obadiah Seeley were probably NOT closely related. And (2), his project also established a DNA profile for the descendants of these two early immigrants to North America. I think these were two remarkable results and we owe Wesley a sincere thank you for his efforts.
- 4. Dr. Ken McCrea agreed to manage a follow-on DNA project to continue investigating the lineage of the Seeley surname. The Seeley DNA Lineage Project has confirmed the Robert and Obadiah Seeley DNA profiles, using a much more accurate 37-marker test. Now, a male with a Seeley surname can be tested and determine whether he is a descendant of Robert or of Obadiah, or of neither. This will surely help focus ancestral research and hopefully save time and resources. Dr. McCrea has developed test participants through the internet, including one Seeley from England who turned out NOT to be descended from either Robert or Obadiah. Other contacts are still contemplating participating in Dr. McCrea's DNA test project. Those members who find, through DNA testing, that they do not descend from either Robert or Obadiah are strong candidates for SGS assistance with determining their ancestor's line.
- 5. Kathie Olsen made a preliminary trip to England at her own expense to organize the SGS trip to England in September 2004. Those 24 people who participated had so much fun and enjoyment that they didn't want the trip to end. We recognized Kathie with a Certificate and Letter of Commendation during the 2005 SGS reunion for her tour organization efforts and for completing the three SGS publications. She is now preparing updates for these publications. At my request, Kathie drafted a letter to the Federation of Genealogical Societies for her Mother, Madeline Mills, to recognize Madeline's efforts in compiling the three SGS publications. As a result, SGS was sent a certificate naming Madeline Mills to the FGS Posthumous Hall of Honor. Kathie is serving her third two-year term as SGS first vice president and in that capacity she has been a valuable advisor to me.
- **6. Linda Crocker** assumed the role of SGS query editor over four years ago when she still lived in England. She is living proof that you don't have to live geographically in North America to take on such a major SGS responsibility. The computer e-mail is probably the greatest advancement in communications since the telephone. Having had the query editor job myself, I know the amount of work and time it takes to "unsnarl" the queries she receives, put them in clear English

language, send them to her query team, then provide a summary of the queries and query responses each quarter to the newsletter editor. We finally had the joy of meeting Linda during the 2005 Reunion in Abilene.

- 7. Dian Little as our Chief Genealogist, Terry Tietjens as the Director of the Seelye Research Center, Ray Hall as our Membership Chairman, John Seely for maintaining the SGS Ancestor File Index and for researching London, England records for another apprentice cordwainer named Robert Seeley (there's only one), and Bob Seeley (the one who lives in Oregon) as our SGS CDROM Project Director - are all SGS volunteers who are setting a wonderful example for those members who might be thinking of contributing to the work of SGS.
- 8. Ruthetta Hansen, Ray Hall, Ann Hall, Caroline L. Haddon, Pamela D. Turner, and Lisa Seley the Seelye Research Center Filing System Volunteers either helped develop the filing system at the Seelye Research Center in Abilene or have agreed to learn it and help do the filing. And most of them live several hundred miles away!

Those members I've mentioned above are not the only ones. I could go on. These members receive no pay for their efforts; in fact most have invested some of their own funds in support of their volunteer SGS positions. I'll continue to list projects needing volunteer help in our newsletters. I hope you'll step up to the bat and hit a home run as well!

So, overall, I believe we are meeting overarching objective of increasing SGS volunteerism. But, yes, there's much more to do.

Financially, we've maintained a constant level of assets in recent years. However, once we decide on research objectives worthy of pursuit, we may need to find additional sources of funds. The latest annual financial statement was in the November 2005 newsletter.

In conclusion, our membership is slowly increasing, our volunteerism is increasing and making solid contributions, and our financial condition is stable. You have every right to be proud of your membership in the Seeley Genealogical Society. Please help us recruit new members.

News from the SGS Board of Directors

First Vice President Kathie Olsen: As vice president, I have two assignments that I have been working on since the last newsletter. The first has been to construct an Excel database of all changes to our SGS publications. I have learned a lot working with this program. On page seven of this newsletter you will find a chart of the most recent changes that have been made to the Nathaniel portion of The Sixth Generation Book.

My next task will be to tackle the changes that have been made to the Obadiah portion of The Sixth Generation Book. After that I will work on the "One Through Five" book changes and then The Seventh Generation Book. I want all those who own the books to be assured that they can have access to all changes that have been made!

I have also given some thought to the next SGS tour: Robert and Obadiah Seeley's New England which is planned for September 2007 immediately following the next SGS reunion. I hope you are planning to come! Put it on your calendar and if you have any suggestions, be sure and let me know!

<u>Chief Genealogist Dian Little:</u> I've been engaged in a search of a connection between Obadiah Seeley in London and Mary Angell Miller or the Slawsons who settled in Stamford, Conn.

I first listed all of the localities and churches listed in Nehemiah Wallington's book -- and there were 53 -- beginning with his residence a few dozen yards from the London bridge on the corner of Philpot Lane and Eastcheap St.

Then I listed the places listed in Slawson or Angell genealogy as found on Ancestry. com or familysearch.org.

There is adequate data to determine that Obadiah likely knew the Slawsons and the Angells in London before he came to Connecticut. It is possible that John Miller brought Obadiah to Stamford to build his house.

Assistant Genealogist Karl Weiler: I was asked by Dian Little to follow up on the references mentioned in the book "Wallington's World" concerning Obadiah Seeley.

My first contact was with Paul S. Seaver, Department Head of History at Stanford University. Seaver was the author of the book "Wallington's World". We exchanged e-mails included below is one I received from him.

Dear Karl Weiler.

I'm fascinated that you are a descendant of Obediah Seeley, and that there is a Seeley genealogical society. I'm not surprised that he emigrated, so many Puritans did in the 1630s, including Wallington's closest friend. You will find more information about Seeley on p.236, n.36; his apprenticeship is recorded in the Turners' Company apprenticeship bindings (Guildhall Library MS 3302/1) and his contract as a journeyman is recorded in the Turners' Company minute book (Guildhall

Library MS 3295/2). All of Wallington's apprentices shared his religious position in one way or another as far as I can tell, but I would dearly love to know how a son of a Birmingham panner found his way to Wallington's shop.

I also contacted the Guildhall Library in London England three times but I was told they were very busy. I then sent an e-mail offering a donation of \$50.00 and the information came the next day by e-mail. The e-mail follows:

Dear Mr Weiler,

Thank you for your email of 1st December.

In response to your enquiry, I have consulted the apprentice binding books for the Turners' Company which contain apprenticeships started in 1636/7 (Guildhall Library Ms 3302/1). I have extracted the following information from the original Latin entry:

"Obediah Seeley son of William Seeley, Birmingham in the County of Warwickshire, draper, [apprenticed to] Nehemihe [sic] Wallington for 9 years from the feast of St Michael Archangel last." This entry is dated 11th January 1626/7 and the fee of 2s 6d is recorded as having been paid.

In addition, the freedom register (also in GL Ms 3302/1) records that William Seeley was made free on 13th October 1635, and that a payment of 13s 4d was made on this date.

I have briefly examined the court minutes of the Turners' Company (GL Ms 3295/2), but regret they do not record apprenticeships or freemen being admitted to the company.

Seeley's in Pennsylvania Land Warrants

A land warrant was (in most cases) the first document issued by the state or province in the process whereby land was transferred from the government to private ownership. The warrantee was the original property owner. The following records are extracted from a CD-ROM-based publication I am working on. When completed, it will include all of the Pennsylvania land warrants starting in 1732. This list includes all Seeley's (all spellings) from 65 of the 67 Pennsylvania counties (excluding Northampton and Luzerne Counties, which I have not yet completed). The "County" column shows

three "application programs" which produced a somewhat different set of documents. These programs ran between 1765 and 1769. They were: ES = East Side [of Susquehanna River] Application number; NP = New Purchase Application number; WS = West Side [of Susquehanna River] Application number.

40 Years Ago in SGS -- Notes From Garner Osborn

Editor's Note: It's a lot of fun for me to look through the older issues of the SGS Newsletter (this is the 127th issue, by the way) and kind of watch as the organization takes shape. I found the notes below from SGS Founder Garner Osborne in the April 1966 -- or 5th -- issue.

Miss Marion and Miss Helen Seelye of Box 337, Abilene, Ks. are among our most recent of discoveries. Their modesty does not permit me to brag on their beautiful home in Abilene. But we can say that their father, Dr. Alfred Seelye, started in once to rally the Seelyes together and he and a cousin were gathering material for a Seelye book when his death stopped it all, 25 or 30 years ago. We are beginning to get access to the work started by he and his cousin.

We are confronted with the necessity of making a start on our proposed Robert Seely Genealogical Society. As we are far from having a complete knowledge of all Seely, Seeley, Seelye, Seally, etc. families in the Americas we feel that in order to hold our ground, we begin with a temporary organization till a more representative organization can be formed.

Traveling costs can be very prohibitive on a nationwide basis, so we have hit upon the device of a temporary organization in the middle west until we know better what we want. We could call a meeting of middle west Seelyes if necessary and meet with more success than in calling out the whole nation and getting only a small representation because of traveling costs. Your editor has known some of the middle west group for several years and has studied their gifts of personality. We have recently been in correspondence with these and we venture a few nominations which all understand are on a temporary basis.

We nominate the following:

Mr. John C. Seelye of 146 Palisades Circle, Manitou Spgs, Colo. 80289. Mr. Seelye is a business man and is in middle life

Mr. Preston Seelye of 1100 Jasmine, Denver, Colo. He has helped from the beginning with the keeping of

financial accounts. He is prompt, is very careful, a thoroughly good man.

Miss Marion Seelye of Abilene, Ks., Box 337 has but recently come to our attention. She is near the big backlog of Seelye information gathered by her father, Dr. Alfred Seelye. She is a very busy woman but has agreed to act as secretary on a temporary basis.

Offers have been made of Seelye books, photographs, etc., for the memento work which should be a part of the Seeley organization. We nominate for the post, the name of Charles Martin (a cousin) of 407 9th. Ave., Charles City, Iowa 50516. Charley is very much interested in the Seelye hunt; the reason -- his mother was a Seelye. This too, will be on a temporary basis. Write him if you have something in mind.

There will need to be regional directors. This can come later. Matters of by-laws, etc., will be discussed later. A site for a Seeley center will be needed later. Be on the look-out for a good place. A name will be needed for the organization. Give us your suggestions. It should include the name of Robert Seeley and his dates. We welcome suggestions from all of you.

Please do not send any dues till the newsletter asks for them. Contributions for the costs of the Seeley Newsletter are acceptable though. It may be continued as an informational organ of the Seeley Society. At any rate, any left over monies will go to it if something else is decided on. Send us your questions and give us all you can of your Seeley history.

Editor's Post Script: The names of those nominees may sound familiar to our more experienced members. Marion Seelye served as SGS Secretary until February 1983, Charles Martin served as custodian until November 1983, Preston Seelye Served as SGS Treasurer until November 1986, and Garner Osborn remained active in SGS until his death on June 5, 1976. The name "Seeley Genealogical Society" actually pre-dates the newsletter from which the above is excerpted. It first appeared in the newsletter in the third issue in Sept. 1965.

Jack died in March 2005 and Dian now lives alone in a condo near Rick and his family so she can visit with her grandchildren Kris, Elizabeth and Theron.



Military Notes

Marine Remembers his "Best Friend"

CAMP RAMADI, AR RAMADI, Iraq (Aug. 11, 2005) --Lance Cpl. Steven R. Seeley, a machine gunner with 4th Platoon, Company B, 1st Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, knelt down in front of a photo of fallen Lance Cpl. Adam J. Strain and paid his respects during a memorial ceremony here Aug. 11.

Marines and Sailors with Camp Pendleton, Calif., -based 1st Battalion, 5th Marines mourned the loss of 21-year-old Strain, a machine gunner with Company B, who fell on Ramadi's urban battlefield Aug. 3 while fighting terror. Seeley and Strain served together and were best friends. Strain was from Smartsville, Calif., and leaves behind his parents, Rob and Karen Strain, and fiancée, Barbara Ann Wyclef.

"We were best friends," said 21-year-old Seeley from Beaverton, Ore., and machine gunner with 4th Platoon, Company B. "He was one of the best men I've known."

While speaking at the memorial service, Seeley explained that he and Strain became friends a year and half ago while attending The School of Infantry (SOI) West at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton, Calif.

"We were rack mates and immediately became close," said the 2002 Westview High School graduate.

Seeley and Strain became machine gunners at SOI and received orders to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, where they were placed in 4th Platoon, Company B. Their friendship continued to strengthen over time.

"We did everything together," said Seeley. Seeley said they would often go to the movies and out to eat together. In addition to being a fun-loving guy who made every outing enjoyable, Seeley said his friend had a kind heart and was loyal to those he cared about.

Seeley said Strain took pride in being a machine gunner and that he was "one of the best, always studying his machine gun knowledge and practicing to become better. He was in the back of the formation whenever we'd go out, and we could do our jobs with the comfort of knowing that Strain had our backs."

Seeley's eulogy also revealed his late friend loved his family more than anything. His parents and fiancée "were the core of his life," he said. "He often talked highly about them."


Seeley joked about how, prior to deploying, he often loaned his cellular phone to Strain so he could call Barbara.

"He didn't have a cell phone, and he always wanted to borrow mine to call his fiancée," he said.

Seeley had the opportunity to witness first hand Strain's immense love for those close to him when he visited Strain's Smartsville country home near Grass Valley north of Sacramento before they deployed to Iraq.

"When I went home with him," Seeley recalled, "I saw just how important his mom and dad and fiancée were to him. He loved them so much."

Seeley said Strain's mother loved to stand outside

and watch her son play with his two dogs, Nugget and Whiskey, in their yard.

"He was always someone I could talk to," he said. "He always had his Marines' backs, which is how he died; watching our backs."

Strain was conducting an early-morning foot-patrol through a section of the Al Anbar capital with his platoon Aug. 3 when the Marines came under enemy fire, said Seeley.

"Strain was in the rear of the formation providing security while we rushed for cover," he said.

Strain was shot by a sniper as he provided covering fire for his comrades with his squad automatic weapon, a light machine gun.

"It was the worst day of my life," Seeley said, eyes tearing up. "I lost my best friend."

Airman Joshua Seeley

Air Force Airman Joshua J. Seeley has graduated from basic military training at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas.

During the six weeks of training, the airman studied the Air Force mission, organization, and military customs and courtesies; performed drill and ceremony marches, and received physical training, rifle marksmanship, field training exercises, and special training in human relations.

In addition, airmen who complete basic training earn credits toward an associate degree through the Community College of the Air Force.

Seeley is the son of Colleen Seeley of East Fifth St., Mishawaka, Ind.

He is a 2005 graduate of Mishawaka High School.

Visitors who come to my web-site (www.deesnetworks.com/karl) will see I have all the research documents available for view. On the upper right hand top of home page click on "research" and many of the documents on Obadiah Seeley are there for you to see.

Diane Little asked me to review the book "The Story of The Early Settlers of Stamford, Connecticut 1641-1700" by Jeanne Majdalany.

There are many references to Obadiah Seeley in this book all of the pages are included on my web-site under "research."

I believe the Obadiah in England who served an apprenticeship as a wood turner is same Obadiah Seeley in Stamford, Conn. On page 56 it mentions in the inventories of Obadiah Seeley that he had a large number of carpentry tools. Obadiah built the home of John Miller and after his death he married his wife.

SGS Ancestor File Index Coord. John Seely: I've been going through a list of the submitter files which I found missing at the Seelye Research Center during the 2005 reunion and making copies of any material I had overlooked in my Carson files. I will be forwarding this additional data to Terry so that I can put them in the submitter file cabinet during the May board meeting period.

I am also adding new families to the NON-SEELEY Ancestor File which were previously not entered due to disk space. SGS Webmaster Chris Havnar: Currently Jerry and I are working on getting extracts from directories up on the website (www.seeley-society.net/directories.html). I've been transcribing and just finished the Colorado directory.

What might be in a directory?

- A geographical description of a county including its geology, soils, agriculture, industries, transport, etc.
- The history of the county, descriptions of the individual towns and villages including the amenities

- such as schools, churches, hospitals, work houses, etc.
- Lists of the inhabitants that have trades, and in most of the later directories even street by street, house by house lists of all householders.

Is my ancestor going to be found in a directory?

Not necessarily. The early directories included people with trades. This doesn't mean just businesses and shops, but anyone with a recognized trade, such as a farmer, a sawyer, a teacher, or a dress maker working from home. Apprentices and laborers were seldom included, although in the later post 1900 directories, that had street listings of people in major towns, such people were included. In any case, only the head of household was listed in a directory, not wives or children, and not lodgers.

Check out the site and you'll see what I mean. I'd love it if other folks could give me something similar for states that they are familiar with.

Membership Chairman Ramon Hall: Annual renewal for 2005 has resulted in sixty-one renewals. Twenty-seven members failed to renew and have been deactivated. As of January 1, 2006, there are 404 who receive the SGS Newsletter. Of these 404, fourteen are genealogical societies, and sixteen are libraries with genealogical research departments. Of the remaining 374, 134 are LIFE members.

As a new initiative, I plan to update the membership computer roster to include e-mail addresses, and to add the primary line of descendancy for each member, i.e. Nathaniel, Obadiah, Both, Other (specify if known). To facilitate this, it would be appreciated if all members would send me this information. See contact data on page 15.

NARA Fund Supports Microfilm

The Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS) is the official collection agency for the Malcom H. Stern - NARA Gift Fund. FGS promotes and publicizes the idea of one dollar per society member per year to finance this fund.

The money collected makes possible the creation of finding aides and the micro-filming of valuable research materials now preserved in the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) in Washington, D.C. The microfilm copies, produced without government funding, are distributed to the NARA Regional Archives for use by researchers. These records are also available through any LDS Family History Center in the world.

Currently, funds are being sought for the microfilming of:

- War of 1812 Pension and Bounty-Land Warrant Records
- United States Colored Troop (USCT) Compiled Service Records.

Other examples of completed projects of the Stern NARA Gift Fund:

- Microfiche of Street Indexes to the 39 larger cities for the 1910 census.
- Galveston Passenger Arrival Records 1896-1948.
- 1920 Census Enumeration Districts.
- Index of War of 1812 Prisoner of War Records.

Access to this information is through any of the regional National Archives, but also through any LDS (Mormon) Family History Center in the world.

Additionally, the FGS NARA Filming Committee will continue to take suggestions for items to be microfilmed. Ideas are solicited from anyone interested in genealogy. The aim is to find material at the National Archives, or its branches, of major interest to genealogists.

I urge you to contribute your dollar to the Stern NARA Gift Fund and support the microfilming of NARA records.

Robert is searching for information on his gr gr gr grandmother - Sarah Seeley, b. 1750(?), d. 18 Dec 1830 in Schaghticoke, Rennsalaer, NY, buried in Old Presbyterian Cem, Schaghticoke. (tombstone still standing). She married Thomas Ireland, b. 1745(?) in Huntington, Long Island, NY, d. 10 Dec 1811 in Schaghticoke, buried in Old Presbyterian Cem in Schaghticoke. Robert wishes to find out Sarah's date and place of birth, her parents, and her siblings. He thinks she may have been from the Saratoga area. County boundaries were changing at that time: Rennsalaer may have been Albany or Washington County. Robert has lots of information on the Ireland family.

SGS Response: We have had 2 previous queries on Sarah and Thomas Ireland (0402-1 and 0105-7) with no response. I found a copy of Thomas Ireland's will on the internet by doing a Google search. Then Dian Little sent the following:

"I have been researching Sarah Seley Ireland for quite sometime as a possible sister of Augustus Seeley. I have been contacted and sent some information to three relatives working on their line: Marlene Hartle, Ross Doherty and Joan Best who found my name from my Augustus Seeley Time Line on the web.

"Sarah and Thomas were married in Newburgh, Orange, NY. Augustus' youngest children were baptized in Schaghticoke. All of Thomas and Sarah's Children were born in Schaghticoke. Sarah and Thomas died in Schaghticoke. Sarah was laid to rest in the Old Presbyterian Cemetery. Their son Selah is in the Albany 1850 census.

"Joan said Augustus wrote to his nephews to encourage them to come to Canada where land was cheap. In 1801 three of Thomas and Sarah's children went to Brockville [formerly Elizabethtown] and bought land near Augustus Seeley - Isaac, Losee and (___) Milke. Isaac spent the rest of his life there and many of his descendants continue to live in Canada, The above named Marlene one of them. A Thomas Ireland Jr. was on the 1842 Tax Record in Nauvoo.

"The Irelands are originally from Warwickshire, England. The first Ireland came about the same time as

One more name, date or place may be the key to connecting your line to another. Your query will also be posted on our website. Make sure we have your current email and normal address — sometimes we get information several months after publication.
