Get Searching! Your Family History Is Now Closer Than Ever

This is an incredible time in the history of the world to be interested in Genealogy and Family History! There are so many resources available to us at this time. There are genealogical societies such as ours with publications and websites. There are libraries specializing in genealogy and family history collections. The internet has opened up more additional resources. You can "Google." There are free sites such as www.familysearch.org and find-a-grave.com that are offering genealogy and family history information. There are also many sites where you can pay to receive the information such as Ancestry.com.

In fact, to help genealogists navigate the ever environment of genealogy technology, FamilySearch has launched a new section on its website called FamilySearch TechTips which aims to bridge the gap between the developing worlds of technology and

You used to have to wait weeks for a vital statistic such as a death certificate to be mailed to your home. Now we sometimes get impatient if something takes more than five minutes. An intercept told me the other day that I might have to wait because there were 500,000,000 names to search!

Recently a friend asked me to find out some information about her friend's grandmother who had been married in 1896. Since the woman had divorced and remarried and lost touch with the first family, her granddaughter was wondering if she might have had other children and where she died and where was she buried. All the friend knew was her Grandmother's name, her Grandfather's name, the date and place of the marriage and the last name of the second husband. Using this little bit of information and some of the above named sources, I was able to assemble the Grandmother's life history with at least twenty different references including a picture of her headstone! Just for your information, she didn't have any more children and she was buried not more than 80 miles away from the place where her granddaughter presently lives which was thousands of miles from the place where her grandparents had been married! It was amazing!! Unfortunately, none of those concerned was a Seeley!

I challenge you to set up a similar situation to locate information on one of your Seeley relatives! And if you locate new information be sure to share it with SGS by contacting me, Linda Crocker, our Genealogist or Chris Havnar, our Webmaster. These women are the co-

A Note From the SRC Librarian Gone More Than A Year, John Seely Still Shares Genealogy Lessons

In September, Kathie and I were able to get together so she could transfer to me the files that John Seely had generously donated to the society. In total there are 21 boxes. I hope to have gone through all of these boxes by the time we meet next April in Abilene.

So far, I've been able to get through three of these boxes and have already discovered something that you might want to use in your own filing system. One of the first boxes I went through were binders of John's personal family history, which were titled "John Robert Seely Evidence." These binders contain copies of every sort of family item you can imagine, newspapers, job reviews, marriage records, land deeds and so on. There didn't seem to be any rhyme or reason to these pieces of paper, which I found very odd, knowing what an organized person John was.


Then I got to box two and in there was a binder titled "Evidence Index." Here was my "Rosetta Stone."

This index is divided into two sections, the first part is a name list with every name listed alphabetically along with the associated evidence for that person and which binder to find it in. The second section is an item number list with each page number listed numerically and the information

associated with that page. When I saw this, I thought that this was a great way to keep track of your proof documents.

John has over 800 pages of documents and didn't worry about filing them by family or time frame. It looks like he just added the documents as he found them and then added them to his index.

Trying to establish my own family files I can see where this



After seeing this, I think I might undo what I have started and change to this type of file system; especially since computers will make formatting the index much easier. Thanks John for opening my eyes to a different and possibly better way of doing things.



Two Friends, Two Ancestors: A Connection From Nearly 400 Years Ago



In 2008, SGS Member Liz Alexander attended her 50th college reunion where she ran into a friend named Jane.

"I don't remember telling her I was a Seeley descendent but I must have," said Alexander.

She believes that because a couple of years later, Jane sent Alexander a copy of a map of Watertown, Mass.

"I was doing a little genealogy," wrote Jane, "and found this in the notes for my multiple great-grandfather, John Lawrence (1609-1667)."

Jane described the map as Bond's Map of Watertown.

"The grant of a homestall to John Lawrence, east of the Fresh Pond, and adjoining that of Robert Seely, implies that he was a first settler; but he settled very early on a lot granted to him on the west side of Common Street, which was his permanent residence, until he moved to Groton, except, perhaps, a temporary residence in Boston."

For Jane, the map showed that the connection she shared with Alexander is one that might also have been shared by their ancestors.

"I guess that means we were neighbors in the 1600s," she wrote. "I lived in the next town over from Watertown for years, but I had no idea that any of my ancestors had ever lived there."

Jane pointed out that on the map, John Lawrence is under the C and Robert Seeley is under the A in Cambridge.

"There's a road there now, said Jane, "and I've driven over it many times."

SGS Founder Garner Osborn Nov. 7, 1887 - June 5, 1976

This summer was the 35th anniversary of the death of Garner Thomas Osborn, the founder of SGS.

Garner was born November 7, 1887 in Burr Oak, Iowa, one of five children born to William Stephen and Alice Seelye Osborn. Stacey and Bernice died in infancy. His mother died in 1893. Left with 3 children, Garner, Sidney and Floyd, his father remarried in 1894 Julia Seelye, the sister of his late wife. In 1894 the family moved to Milford, Iowa. Julia lived until 1922 and to that union was born a daughter, Grace. William Osborn died in 1944 at the home of his daughter Grace Caauwe in Lakefield, Minnesota.

Garner's Seelye grandparents were Thomas and Helen Hill Seelye. They were married April 6, 1861, and were the parents of eleven children; nine of whom were alive in 1914 when Helen Seelye died. The children resided in lowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, North Dakota, and Oregon. Thomas Seelye died in 1908 when nearly eighty years old. He is buried in eastern lowa.

Lloyd Glenn Seeley, SGS President from 1968-1970

This year is the 25th anniversary of the death of Lloyd Glenn Seeley, President of SGS from 1968 to 1970.

I remember being asked (I believe at the 2003 reunion in Williamsburg, VA) if I could find any information about Lloyd Seeley, one of the early presidents of SGS. I put that request aside, and frankly, it slipped my mind. However, for the SGS website, I was starting a project to collect vital records, copies of death certificate and obituaries of Oregon residents with the surname SEELEY/Y/YE. While collecting data from the Oregon Archives and during numerous hours with newspaper microfilm in the library at the University of Oregon, I did find information on Lloyd Seeley.

Lloyd was born May 20, 1906 in North Bend, Oregon. He graduated from Oregon Normal School (now Western Oregon State College) in 1930 and in 1935 earned a bachelor of arts degree from Oregon State University.

He entered the teaching field and came to Klamath County in the early 1930s as principal at the old Indian school in Beatty. Subsequently he was principal at Bly and Henley schools and during the 1940s worked as a health sanitarian for Klamath County. He later returned to the profession as an administrative supervisor, retiring in 1968.

During his younger years, Lloyd was a 4-H leader, was active in Boy Scouts, and was a junior rifle instructor for the

National Rifle Association.

Lloyd died, aged 85 in Klamath Falls Feb. 20, 1986.

Lloyd's father, Curtis Seeley, was born in Green County Illinois Jan. 12, 1873. He was the son of Captain and Mrs. William Seely. He spent the earlier part of his life in Illinois and when 15 years of age moved to Oregon with his family who located near Springfield. Prior to coming to Benton County in 1928 the family had resided at Aumsville, Marion County for 10 years. Curtis was



married to Miss Stella Kirkpatrick who survived him. He was also survived by three sisters - Mrs. Lucy Warfield, Alsea; Mrs. Lena E. Klein, Portland, and Mrs. Inez McNelly, Beaverton; and one brother, Charles Seely of Alsea. A brother Harry H. Seely died Sept. 21, 1932 in Corvallis. Curtis died March 2, 1933 two miles west of Alsea, Oregon.

Library and Archives Canada Digitizes Past Issues of Canada Gazette

Library and Archives Canada Press Release

Library and Archives Canada (LAC) commemorated the 170th anniversary of the Canada Gazette September 26, 2011 by making accessible the digitized back issues, from 1841 to 1997, on its website dedicated to this official publication.

"Current issues of the Canada Gazette have been available to Canadians at most libraries and through

subscription, and the Canada Gazette Directorate has a searchable database on its website of all issues since 1998," said Daniel J. Caron, Deputy Head and Librarian and Archivist of Canada.



"However, an online database that includes all issues of the Canada Gazette, since 1841 and searchable by keyword, is a major achievement that allows even greater access to this very important resource."

Digitization of these back issues began in 2008. At that time, LAC's database contained about 30 percent (or close to 300,000 pages) of the Canada Gazette corpus, including images taken from microfilm, microfiche and rare original copies of the Gazette held at LAC. In August 2010, the staff of LAC and the Canada Gazette inventoried the missing editions and, with the help of the Canada Gazette Directorate, were able to get copies from other libraries across Canada. Today's announcement of the launch of the entire publication marks the completion of this multi-

year initiative.

The initiative was made possible thanks to the contribution of the Department of Canadian Heritage, more specifically its Canadian Culture Online Program. LAC also wishes to acknowledge the collaboration of the Canada Gazette Directorate, which provided funding assistance for the development of the database and supported the

creation of the written content for LAC's website, A Nation's Chronicle: The Canada Gazette.

Often referred to as "the official newspaper of the Government of Canada," the

Canada Gazette has been an important instrument in the Canadian democratic process for 170 years. It has informed Canadians of the operations of government and encouraged them to participate in the legislative process.

The mandate of Library and Archives Canada is to preserve the documentary heritage of Canada for the benefit of present and future generations, and to be a source of enduring knowledge accessible to all, thereby contributing to the cultural, social and economic advancement of Canada. Library and Archives Canada also facilitates co-operation among communities involved in the acquisition, preservation and diffusion of knowledge, and serves as the continuing memory of the Government of Canada and its institutions.

2011 SGS Reunion Souvenir Books For Sale



Cambridge University is Home to Seeley Historical Library

The Seeley is one of the largest libraries in Cambridge and its primary role is to support the History Faculty's teaching programme by providing students with access to a wide range of printed, online and audio-visual material.

It was first established in 1807 when John Symonds, Regius Professor of Modern History, gathered its nucleus of 1,000 books. His immediate successor, Professor William Smyth (1807-1849), added many volumes, but thereafter the library appears to have fallen into disuse. In 1884 Oscar Browning, University Lecturer in History, launched an appeal for a new library to meet the need of undergraduates and a considerable number of additions were made over the next few years. In 1890 the entire collection was transferred from the gallery of the Philosophical Library to a room in King's College and the following year an annual grant of £30.00 was voted for maintenance.

In 1895 a memorial fund was raised to commemorate Sir John Seeley's services to the Empire and to the University and the greater part of this fund was devoted to the endowment of the library, which was named after him in 1897. In 1912 the collection relocated to the top floor of the newly-reopened Arts School, Bene't Street, then in



1935 to the Old Schools. In 1968 the Seeley moved to the Sidgwick site as part of the new History Faculty building designed by the internationally-renowned architect, James Stirling. Its unusual radial design, spanning an L-shaped teaching block, accommodates over 300 reading spaces and houses around 95,000 volumes.

Scott's information follows with my comments in italics: Horace Seeley is listed in Fountain County, Indiana records in 1860. He served throughout the Civil War with Indiana Regiments. He married Frederika Amelia Kornbau (apparently her 2nd marriage according to marriage record above – I found her as Amelia Kornbau in earlier censuses) They lived in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he was a real estate broker for over 50 years. Scott has a picture dated 1919 with Horace and Frederika and four children named Walter, Montreville, Paul, and Freda. Horace died in 1937 at age 91 in Philadelphia and is buried in Mount Vernon Cemetery, Philadelphia.

Frederica (Freda) Louisa Seely, Scott's paternal grandmother, was born October 6, 1895 in Philadelphia. She married William H. Lewellen on October 31, 1921 in Khamgaon Berar, Central India — they were Christian Missionary Alliance missionaries. They had three children — Melvin, Edgar, and Gwen. Freda died May 3, 1983 in Ft. Myers, Florida, and is buried in Fluvanna Cemetery, Fluvanna (Jamestown), New York.

India, not coming to America until the age of 8. Being the son of a preacher, he never had a real hometown as a child. After serving in the Navy's Pacific Theater during WWII, and college, he married Winifred Rhebergen of Clymer, N.Y., June 12, 1948. They had three children: Scott, Wendy, and David. He was a physical education teacher, coach, and camp director in Bemus Point, Chautauqua County, N.Y. Melvin died June 7, 2004 in Venice, Fla., and is buried in the Bemus Point Cemetery.

I also found a Civil War military record for Horace's brother: Solomon Seely of Lafayette, Ind. enlisted 10 Dec 1861 for the Union from Indiana. Service Record: Enlisted as a Private on 10 December 1861. Enlisted in Company G, 40th Infantry Regiment Indiana on 10 Dec 1861. Died from wounds Company G, 40th Infantry Regiment Indiana on 27 Jul 1864. (The unit was in Ga. at the time)

We would love to know the maiden name of Horace Seely's 1st wife and the name of Frederika Amelia Kornbau's 1st husband.

An ordained minister from 1912, Garner served many parishes as pastor in Iowa. He served the Lyons (Colo.) Methodist Church for several years beginning in 1954. He later made his home in Longmont, Colo. He was survived by a son, Edwin G. Osborn of Kearney, Nebraska and eight grandchildren. A daughter, Phylis Osborn Simonson, preceded him in death in 1959.

Garner Osborn, spent over 15 years gathering Seeley family records. During that time he originated the Seeley Newsletter, thus founding the Seeley Genealogical Society. Without him and his later encouragement and inspiration, our organization might have gone by the wayside. Judy Laslo (juteshouse@comcast.net) visited Trumbull, Fairfield, CT and found some information on these children of Caroline Seeley and John Peck: Vital records volume 1 page 282

1) Rebecca married Frank Squinobal on February 20, 1878 in Trumbull he was 33 born Switzerland and it was his first marriage; she was 31 born Newtown, CT and it's her second marriage as she is called Rebecca Crofut at the time of this marriage. I couldn't find Rebecca's marriage to Mr. Crofut in Trumbull or Newtown vital records. According to records volume 1 page 295 Rebecca and Frank Squinobal had a son, no name given, born May 19, 1880 in Trumbull. I did find his name listed with his father in the 1900 census for Trumbull: Leonard F. born May 1880. Rebecca died (volume 1 page 363) September 2, 1889 – born Weston – cause of death spinal meningitis.

Frank married Johannah Mattegat on June 24, 1891 in Trumbull, he was age 45 born Switzerland 2nd marriage, she was age 21 born Germany 1st marriage. They had 2 daughters: Jane Rebecca b. July 28, 1895(volume 2 page 6), daughter, no name given, was stillborn on May 5, 1899 (volume 2 page 11). 1900 census list Frank Squinobal age 55 born Switzerland January 1845 — married 9 years — immigrated 1872 he's a citizen — owns home — he's a butcher, wife Johannah age 28 born Germany April 1872 — married 9 years — immigrated 1888, son Leonard F. age 20 born Connecticut May 1880 — single — his father born Switzerland his mother born Connecticut — he's a teamster, son George B. age 8 born Connecticut January 1892, daughter Jenny B. age 4 born Connecticut July 1895.

2) Emeline (volume 1 page 321) death April 17, 1883 Trumbull, she was 29 born Newtown – cause of death Phthisis. Her husband, Charles Burr Hawley (volume 2 page 9), died July 28, 1896 – 47 years old – cigar manufacturer – cause of death opium narcosis.

That led your Query Editor to the Hawley Society website http://www.hawleysociety.org/links.html where I found:

Elias Sill Hawley of Buffalo, New York, compiled a comprehensive HAWLEY genealogy over 40 years of research on descendants of Joseph Hawley of Stratford, Connecticut, and published THE HAWLEY RECORD in 1890. The Massachusetts line of Thomas Hawley, possibly a brother of Joseph of Stratford, also appears. In addition, Elias Hawley listed many unconnected HAWLEY families. Although Elias Hawley endeavored to include all known lines of the HAWLEY surname, several HAWLEY families were unintentionally omitted.

American M.A.R.C. started out as a manufacturer of small, light-weight diesel engines that ranged from 1 H.P to 18 H.P. These engines were built for a variety of purposes from pumping water, to the generation of electric power. The majority of these engines were built for the U.S. Defense Department. In the late 1950s, the company began a public offering of shares in an effort to expand and improve production capacity and reduce manufacturing costs.

In an attempt to diversify it's portfolio, American Marc made the bold move to enter the boat manufacturing business. This foray into the consumer leisure market appears to have been very brief, lasting from 1959 to perhaps, the early part of 1961.

To design the new line of boats, American Marc chose an accomplished young naval architect named Blaine Seeley. Seeley attempted to create a variety of designs that would appeal to many different consumer profiles. Models ranged from the sporty "Stardust", a 15 foot two seater, all the way up to the impressive "Marc 28" Motor Yacht, powered by twin American Marc diesel inboard engines.

Blaine also appears in numerous Navy Muster Rolls during WWII.

Darlene, a member of SGS, is wondering if we can find the parents of her great-great-grandfather John B. Seeley. He was born June 3, 1835 in Niagara, New York and died June 14, 1903 in Prairie City, McDonough Co., IL. He is buried with his wife Sarah and daughter Susan in the Prairie City Cemetery. He married Sarah Elizabeth Miller, daughter of Avery and Susan (nee Wilson) Miller of Canada, later they moved to Richfield, Genesee, Michigan Darlene doesn't know the date of their marriage but their first child was born in 1862 and Sarah was still listed on 1852 Ontario, Canada census living at home with her parents. Sarah was born Sep 23, 1837 in Canada (probably York, Ontario) and died Sep 12, 1905 in Dorchester, Saline, Nebraska at the home of her brother

Arthur and his wife. John and Sarah had 5 children. Two died in infancy. The others are:

A distant cousin had listed "Brown" as John's middle name but Darlene hasn't been able to verify that info. She found a John Seeley in Niagara, NY in the 1850 US Census that matches his age. The father's name is Gideon Seeley but she can't verify that this is her John Seeley. Darlene's father had a DNA test through SGS and he has been matched to the Nathanial profile.

SGS Response:

evening surrounded by a few friends, George W. Sutton to Mrs. Jennie Seely Crosby. Rev. E. Brown performed the ceremony which was followed by a nicely laid lunch. Another mention of Jennie:

22 May 1900 Sterling Standard - Mr. and Mrs. George Sutton of Antioch, Illinois have arrived here to attend the Seely Golden Anniversary tomorrow. They were accompanied by their little dog, Fannie.

Jennie and Addison Bates Crosby adopted a son, Walter Percy Crosby.

Walter Percy Crosby was born in 1876. Addison Bates Crosby died in April 1881 and daughter Dolly M Crosby was born, according to New York Births and Christenings 1640 - 1962, 28 October 1881 in Brooklyn, Kings County, New York.

Jennie named her daughter after her mother Dolly (wife of Ebenezer Seely). Her brother S. M. Seely also had a daughter, Miss Dolly Seely of Chicago. Jennie must have been pregnant with Dolly when Addison died in April 1881.

Pat says that in the family, Jennie is referred to as "the woman who raised Walter" which makes her wonder if Dolly died very young, as she seems to disappear after the record of her birth. She also says that the family talked about Walter having a (half) sister named Dolly, as it has always been told that Addison was Walter's real father, that he was left on the doorstep by the birth mother, and that Jennie raised him and loved him as her own.

Pat asked for any information on Jennie A. Seely Moulton Crosby Sutton, any information on the adoption of her son Walter, any information on her daughter Dolly?

SGS Response:

I found Jennie and George Sutton in the 1900 census of Antioch, Lake, IL It says they have been married 17 years and that she has had 2 children but none are living. Jennie b. Apr 1848 IL, parents b. NY

In 1910 in Jacksonville, Morgan, IL Jennie and George are both in their 2nd marriages, md 17 yrs, she has had 3 ch., 1 living.... Perhaps the difference is that she is counting Walter as a child this time. I imagine the 17 years is a census taking mistake in 1910 and should read 27.

I also found Addison and Jennie Crosby with adopted son Walter age 3 in the New York City census in 1880. It says Walter's parents were b. in Ireland and he was b. in NY. I also found him later settled in Van Buren County MI, married to Matilda and they had 3 children.

I have not been able to find any records for Dolly Crosby. Please contact me if you have any information on Jennie Seely Moulton Crosby Sutton and her family.

Marjorie has two lines of descent from George and Alice Sealy of Burke County NC, through two of his daughters: Nancy Patience Sealy who married Samuel Criswell and Alice who married John Brown. Elisha Brown, son of Alice and John Brown married Margaret Criswell, widow of J. Horn, daughter of Nancy P and Samuel Criswell. Marjorie descends from their daughter Margaret Malinda, b. 10 Dec 1840 Hancock Co. IL, married Anciel Twitchell 23 Mar 1858 Beaver, Beaver Co. UT and died in

Beaver 6 Aug. 1864.

George Sealy was born about 1740 and died in Burke Co. NC in 1811. He resided in Morganton, Burke, NC in 1810. His name appears in many Burke County records from the late 1770's until his estate is settled in 1812. In the mid-1770's he is mentioned in property transactions of Tyron and Rowan counties. The only clue to George's origins is a 1778 property transaction in Burke County that mentions a line between (property of) Geo. Walker, Isuk Sealy and Geo. Sealy.

Marjorie has found a marriage of an Isaac Sealy to Mary Hughes on 21 Dec 1720 at Christ Church in Philadelphia, PA. Isaac was buried at Christ Church 1 Feb 1745. Marjorie wonders if George and Isuk Sealy of Burke Co. NC are sons of the Philadelphia Isaac Sealy. However there is also a line of Sealys in Rutherford County NC (which borders Burke Co.) who are related to Joseph Sealey of SC. However Marjorie hasn't found any direct tie between George and these other Sealeys.

SGS Response: We don't have any further information on George Sealy and his family. We do get occasional queries about Sealy/Sealey families in the Carolinas and would love to have someone from that area on our Query team. If you can help with this family or with research in the Carolinas please contact me.
