SGS Membership is Declining: Here's How You Can Help Reverse the Trend

A lot has happened since the last Newsletter regarding Membership. I assumed the position of Membership Chair on May 15, 2019, on an interim basis until a permanent replacement can be found. If you are interested, please get in touch with President Lynda Simmons. Connie Birth has volunteered to be the Assistant Membership Chair.

Everyone should have received our letter asking for your ideas to solve the following dilemma: the Seeley Genealogical Society is losing members at an alarming rate. In April 2010, we had 425 registered members. Currently, we have only 233! We must reverse this declining trend or face the eventual possibility of dissolving SGS.

We are asking all members to send us their ideas that we can then put into action! Here are some questions you might ask yourself to stir some ideas:

1. What do you like best about SGS?
2. What would you change about SGS, or how can we improve

what we are doing?

3. Have you visited our new website?
4. Is the Newsletter important to you?
5. Do you read the Newsletter each time it comes?
6. Are Reunions important to you?
7. Have you attended an SGS Reunion?
8. Do you have relatives and friends in SGS?
9. Is SGS research of value to you?
10. What does SGS offer that encourages you to remain a member and participate?
11. Please tell us something we did not ask.

A natural reaction is to offer reasons on why membership is declining. How can we take action on excuses? There is not a lot we can do about death. We prefer positive ideas.

Connie and I have already put into action a few ideas.

First, we discovered that twenty-five SGS members were not receiving the SGS Newsletter, twenty-three of

whom are LIFE members! We sent a letter to every, since none had an email; so far we have had five replies.

Second, we proposed a plan to the Executive Board to slow or abate declining membership, and/or possibly increase membership. The Board unanimously approved the plan during the SGS Reunion. The plan depends on members helping us define ideas we can put into action.

Third, we are redesigning the membership application form to include an alternate point of contact. Many times we lose members because they have moved and failed to provide a new postal address, phone number, or email address. A second person to get in touch with will help us find a valuable member.

Fourth, if all else fails, we ask Chris Havnar to use her talents to find an obituary for a member with whom we have lost contact. Keeping our members is a high priority for us.

Fifth, we are in the process of upgrading the membership packet, which each new member receives, into a membership notebook, where members will be able to exchange material contained in the binder when new material becomes available. The binder will contain information to help each new member learn more about SGS. It can also be used as a recruiting tool for current members to share with prospective new members.

We earnestly need your help in providing ideas we can put into action to reverse this serious declining membership trend. Please send your ideas to either Jim Seeley or Connie Birth. Their contact information is located on page fifteen of this newsletter.

An Unexpected Seeley Encounter

On a recent trip to Austin, TX, to research the Bell ancestry of my wife, Lou Ann, we stopped en route at the Coronado Historic Site in Albuquerque, NM. While we enjoyed this important monument marking the place where Francisco Vásquez de Coronado in 1540 encountered the Kuaua Indians at their pueblo on his way to find the fabled Seven Cities of Cibola, we will actually long remember our visit there for a reason completely unrelated to Coronado's unsuccessful search.

While I was following the well marked trail to view the remains of various buildings in the pueblo, Lou Ann and her sister, Lil, stopped in at the site's gift shop. Imagine their surprise to find unusual jewelry on sale there, made by Alice Warder Seely, a New Mexican artist, craftsman, sculptor, writer, and botanist, who currently resides in Hondo, NM.

Alice, many of whose ancestors have been born in New Mexico for many generations, traces her immediate roots to her father, the famous muralist and New Mexico native William (Willie) Warder (1920-1999), and her stepfather, the even more celebrated Navajo artist Ha-So-De (Narciso Platero Abeyta) (1918-98), often referred to as the "Gauguin of American Indian Art." Her paternal grandparents, Julian Will Warder (1879-1958) and Benita Cordova (1889-1940), were from the small Spanish village of Guadalupita, NM; besides their Spanish background, they also descend from San Juan and Comanche Indians. Alice's maternal grandmothers, educators Alice Gulielma Howland (1883-1978) and Eleanor Oliva Brownell (1876-1968),

came to Santa Fe in the early 1940s from Pennsylvania, where Howland had taught, and Brownell had served as headmistress of the Shipley School, founded in Bryn Mawr, PA, in 1888 by Howland's aunts, Hannah, Elizabeth, and Katherine Shipley. The house Howland and Brownell built in Santa Fe in a neighborhood since named for them, the Brownell-Howland Area, is listed on the National Register; among other accomplishments, they were the first presidents of the Santa Fe Opera and original trustees of Santa Fe Preparatory School, established in 1963. Alice's mother was Sylvia Ann Shipley (1923-2001).

Drawing upon this rich artistic heritage, Alice creates unique pins, bracelets, earrings, pendants, necklaces, and rings in satin-finished lead-free pewter, which she markets both under her own name and the brand Urban Fetishes at

affordable prices. She and her husband, David Seeley, also operate an iris farm in Hondo. Photos of Alice's jewelry can be seen at the old SGS website in "Alice Warder Seely—Jewelry Sculptor and Designer" in "From the Attic."

We are always happy to discover other members of the wonderful and talented Seely/Seeley family.

Report on 7th Generation Books

After getting requests for Seventh Generation Books, discussion began on getting more books printed. I checked into printing costs, and it was decided to have some copies printed. Before printing, we decided to update the books by having the errata printed with the books. I volunteered to type up the errata and have them placed in the books. I then decided to see if I could make the errata changes directly into the book. The one requirement for incorporating the errata directly was that it could not change the pagination of the books and cause the printed indices to become invalid.

The errata that would cause pagination changes have been included at the back of each section, and references to those errata have been made directly in the applicable section. The foreword has also been updated to remove inaccurate information. These changes have resulted in the Seventh Generation Families Revised 2019 book. I hope to have the new book proofed and ready for printing by the end of summer.

Hotel. The hotel and all of Old Town are part of the California Department of Parks and Recreation.

We had sixty-seven members register for our Reunion from eleven different states. They attended many different meetings, activities, and meals. The barbecue dinner at the Mormon Battalion Visitors' Center had the largest group attending with over eighty-five people.

Our theme for our 2019 SGS San Diego Reunion was "Saddle up Seeleys. California Here We Come." The Seeleys surely did come, and we are so glad!

Our Reunion started with a Board meeting on Wednesday, June 26, 2019, in the Bandini Room of the Cosmopolitan Hotel. The Board not only discussed the details of the meetings and activities, but also the Seventh Generation Book, research, membership, website, Reunion Souvenir Book, and standing committees. We discussed the creation of a committee to update the SGS Constitution and voted on a recommendation for the site of the 2021 Reunion. I want to thank the SGS Board. They do so much in their individual jobs all year and then come together to discuss SGS successes and concerns and make policies that Board members hope will strengthen the Seeley Genealogical Society.

After the Board meeting, we joined other members at the Coyote Restaurant in Old Town for a tasty Mexican dinner. There were almost forty members attending. At 8:00 pm we had planned to have a welcoming meeting at the Cosmopolitan Hotel, but there only were four of us present. Because attendees were finishing their dinners and arriving late in San Diego,

we decided to skip the meeting and let members meet and visit with each other in small groups.

Thursday morning, June 27, was our first session of the Reunion. After a welcome, we all enjoyed singing the darling and well written song, "San Diego, Here We Come." The song was written and directed by our talented and enthusiastic member Lou Ann Crisler. Our members loved the song and loved singing it!

After welcoming everyone and giving an overview of our reunion, we were pleased to have Jesse Crisler introduce illustrator, painter, and author Laura Seeley. Laura gave each of us two white sheets of paper. One had a larger oval drawn on it and the other a smaller one. Laura had us begin with the paper with the larger oval. With her step-by-step instructions, we were each able to draw an adorable Teddy bear. Laura then guided us through drawing a Dalmatian starting with the smaller oval. We were all surprised and pleased at how well we had done and how each of us had created a very good drawing. Laura teaches art in

schools and taught us well. We loved how she guided us. Laura then talked briefly about her books and individually autographed books for all those who wanted them.

After the break, we were glad to hear our SGS members talked about how Seeleys were involved in the history of San Diego and California. Mary Ann Kirk, dressed in a pioneer costume, gave an interesting description of the history of the Mormon Battalion, how the men of the Battalion made a positive impact in the San Diego area, and how a Seeley was part of it. Mary Ann and her husband, David, are serving as missionaries at the Mormon Battalion Visitors' Center. Our members went to the Center that evening to hold a barbecue dinner. Mary Ann wanted our members to understand the history of the Mormon Battalion before we visited the Center.

Camille Bell and Annette Earl enthusiastically informed us about the adventures of Seelys in the San Bernardino area. In 1851 Brigham Young asked almost five hundred

members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to travel from Salt Lake City to lower California and settle it. Members of the Seely family were among them. David and Mary Pettit Seely and Justus Wellington and Clarissa Jane Wilcox Seely were part of this group. My great-grandfather John Henry Seely was born in San Bernardino. In 1857, when the United States Army marched into and camped in Salt Lake City, Brigham Young asked the members to come back to Utah. Because Mary liked San Bernardino, David and Mary decided to return to San Bernardino are buried there. Camp Seely still exists in the hills above San Bernardino.

We enjoyed hearing Patricia Palmer talk about her great grandparents Albert and Emily Seeley who built and ran the Cosmopolitan Hotel. Patricia told us about their family and them. Albert had a stage coach business, built the stables and carried mail between San Diego and Los Angeles. Patricia also gave us copies of her talk and articles from the *Cosmopolitan Chronicle* written about "True tales from the annals of history, archaeology, construction and restoration of the Casa de Bandini & Cosmopolitan Hotel."

Jesse Crisler gave an informative history of the Seelys and the Gold Rush. David and Justus Wellington Seely and their families were part of a company of 50 wagons sent by Brigham Young to San Bernardino. They mined for a while there. Then David and others went to Los Angeles and on to San Francisco and the gold fields. They joined men from the Mormon Battalion and members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-

day Saints who were present when gold was discovered at Sutter's Mill. David and many others went back to Salt Lake City with their gold. This was an important infusion of wealth into the struggling Utah economy.

Delicious box lunches were provided each day during the reunion. Camille Bell arranged and picked up the lunches. They were varied, tasty, and appreciated by our members.

After lunch on Thursday, our members enjoyed a fun historic tour of Old Town guided by Lou Ann and Jesse Crisler and Camille Bell. They were all dressed in pioneer costumes. We met in front of the Cosmopolitan Hotel and walked around the square as they skillfully and happily described the different buildings, their functions, and their histories. Members learned interesting facts about each site. At the Seeley Stable, we were joined by Mary Jones and Roy Backman, representatives of the Old Town State Historical Park. This was a wonderful opportunity to learn more about Old

Town. We really enjoyed our tour!

The Thursday night dinner was a barbecue in the picnic area of the Mormon Battalion Visitors' Center. Dave Petersen prepared a delicious pulled pork dinner with all the trimmings. Dave's family helped him organize things. Dave Peterson is Margaret and Ken Petersen's son. We are grateful to Dave for coming from Victorville and making our tasty dinner. We had the largest attendance of the reunion at this event.

After dinner we moved inside to the theater. Patricia Palmer introduced Linda Jacobo and Connie Gunther from the Descendants of Early San Diego who attended dinner and spoke briefly to our members. Patricia then introduced our speaker Nicole Turner, Associate State Archaeologist for California State Parks, who expertly described the restoration of the Cosmopolitan Hotel and Old Town. She showed us many pictures highlighting the different stages of the restoration. Nicole did a wonderful

job of describing the restoration. We loved her photos. Thursday was a very nice day at our Reunion in San Diego.

Friday morning turned out to be quite an adventure. We were able to see for ourselves the things that Nicole Turner had talked about the night before. Patricia Palmer started the morning by introducing Nini Minovi who is the California Department of Parks and Recreation's Cosmopolitan Hotel Archaeological Project Leader. Nini spoke briefly about the restoration of the hotel and then split us into groups. One group went with Stephen Van Wormer, historical archeologist with specialty in interior and exterior walls, who talked about the excavation of the exterior walls and showed us pictures of the excavation. A second group went with Eric Minella, Director of Historical Interpretation of Old Town San Diego. Eric took us to different hotel rooms and showed us how they were updated, while still keeping their historical significance. A third group went with Foresta Von Kurt, a surface designer who specialized in historical building. Foresta talked about and showed the different kinds of surfaces at the Cosmopolitan Hotel and how they were restored. Nini took the last group. She guided us to an opening between floors where we climbed a ladder to see how the original stairs were constructed. She took us all around the inside and outside of the building describing what the hotel was like originally and how it had been restored. Nini showed us a new stage sign they were painting outside and a large new sign for the Cosmopolitan Hotel that would be lifted into place by a crane that very afternoon. Eric and Nini both told us how grateful they were that the Seeley Genealogical Society held its reunion

We saw the *Star of India*, Harbor Island, Shelter Island, the North Island Naval Air Station, bait barges, and the Cabrillo Monument when we went north. The boat turned around and went south where we saw the U.S.S. *Midway* aircraft carrier, the Naval Amphibious Base, and Tuna Town. We also cruised under the Coronado Bridge. Our naval veterans really enjoyed seeing the ships and reminiscing. It was a most pleasant

voyage and a lovely afternoon.

Shelby says, "I have hit a snag in researching my family ancestry. I am hoping you can help!" Shelby is looking for information on Jonathan Seelye, born in 1805 in OH and married to Angelina Hyde from Tazewell, IL, 26 August 1839. By 1850 they are no longer married, as she is listed in the 1850 US Census with Robert Hyde and living in St. Louis, MO, with no documentation of Jonathan, as well as another marriage record to William S. Reazy (should be Hoby) for 1850 in St. Louis. Shelby noted another marriage for a Jonathan Seelye to Mary Titus on 2 July 1839 in Tazewell County, IL.

SGS Response: I found this from an earlier query: This information was taken from a story about Jonathan's grandson, Joseph, that appeared in *The History of Illinois and Her People* by George Washington Smith, published in Chicago by the American Historical Society, 1927.

"Jonathan Seelye was the head of the family party that came overland from Ohio to Illinois in 1833, settling on land which he had entered from the government in Topeka Township, Mason County (Illinois), where he built his log cabin and cleared and cultivated a farm. Unlike many of the early settlers, at the time of his arrival he was possessed of a few thousand dollars, considered a fortune in that day and locality, and thus did not have to suffer the hardships that fell to the lot of the majority who located in this region with little to assist them save their splendid

determination and industry. Jonathan was a man who always liked to be close to Nature, and as the community offered plenty of good fishing and as deer and other game were to be found in the near vicinity, he was perfectly satisfied with his new surroundings. However, he was by no means an indolent man, but worked industriously when not engaged in hunting or fishing and became one of the substantial and influential figures of his locality. He brought up his children to God-fearing ways, saw them marry and take homes of their own, and died rich in years and contentment, being buried on the old home place. At his side lies his faithful and worthy wife, a Pennsylvania Dutch woman, whom he married in Ohio. They were the parents of: Abner, Jonathan, Douglas, Julius, Bartholomew, Riley, who married twice, Emily who married twice and died in Havana, Illinois, and another daughter.

Based on the above information, I think the Jonathan Seelye married to Angelina Hyde in 1839 is the elder Jonathan and the Jonathan married to Mary Titus is his son. I am not convinced that the Angelina Hyde in MO is the same woman who married Jonathan Seelye in Illinois. We do not know the ancestry of these Jonathan Seelyes. If you have any light to shed on this, please be in touch.

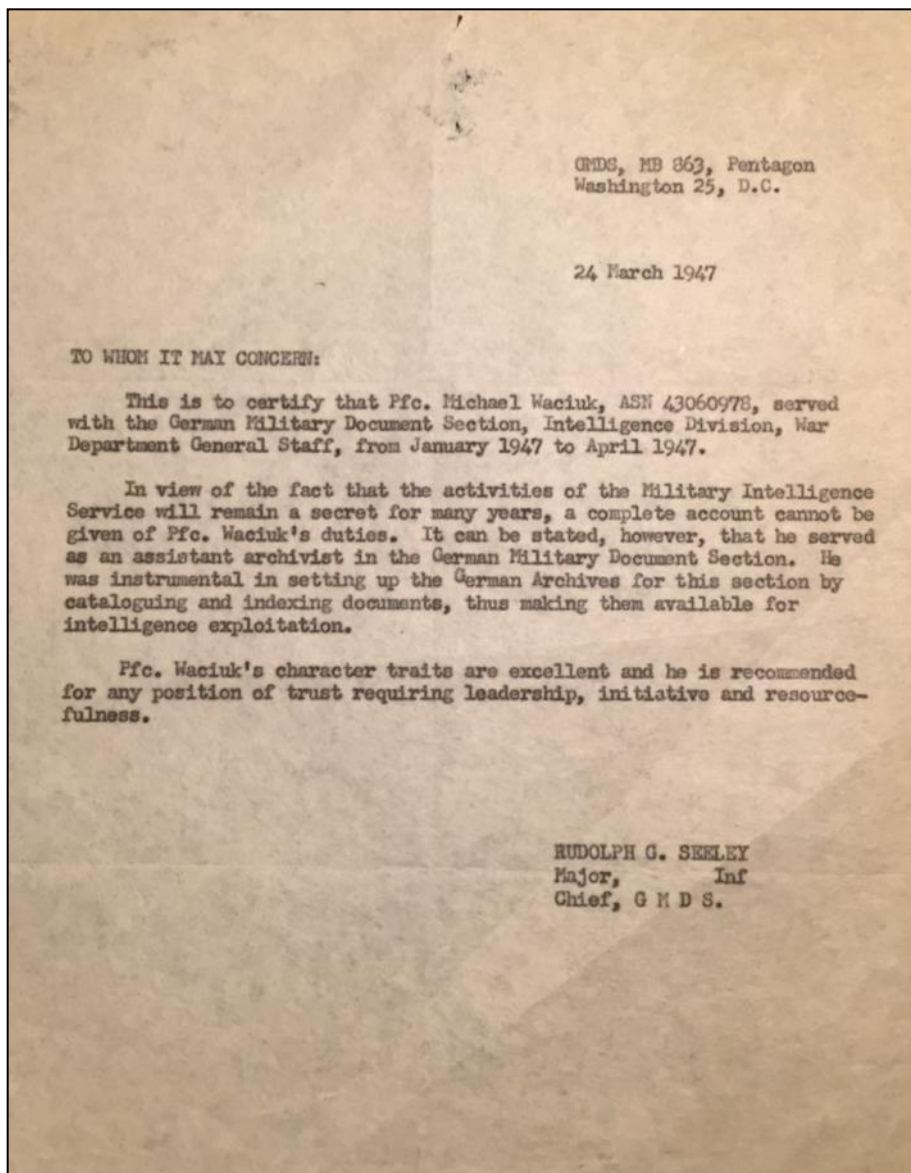
SGS Response: Ebenezer is SGS #2491, a son of Justus (SGS #914) and Elizabeth Fuller. We list one of his brothers

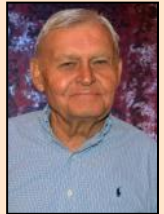
