DNA Test Results Show Cilley and Seeley Families May Not Be Related

I recently reviewed the 46-marker Y-chromosome test result from a male member of the Cilley family line. According to my (Jim's) count, there were 24 matches out of 41 markers compared with Obadiah Seeley's haplotype and 29 matches out of 42 markers compared with Nathaniel Seeley's haplotype.

I asked Dr. Ken McCrea, the SGS DNA Lineage Project Manager, "Do you agree that the Cilley/Cillay family line is therefore not closely related to the Obadiah or Nathaniel Seeley lines?"

Dr. McCrea responded "With 46 markers (really 37 different ones), a difference of less than 5-6 is what would be expected for being related within a few hundred years. Differences this large are indicative of non-

relatives."

One DNA test result does not prove the lack of a relationship. Several more male Cilley family members should be tested to establish proof.

Although many of us are disappointed in this result, I hope that the Cilley families will continue as active members of the Seeley Genealogical Society. Some have become very close friends. Sharing such a close family spelling is enough, in my opinion, to continue SGS membership of these family lines. It is little different, really, from the descendants of immigrants Obadiah and Robert (father of Nathaniel) Seeley. DNA testing has shown that these two seventeenth century immigrants were not closely related either.

More testing of males with the Seeley/Seely/Cilley/Sealy surname and with documented lineage to one of these immigrants; Robert, Richard or Obadiah, is needed to determine more than one generation from the DNA. Also we need those of the Seeley (any spelling) surname and documented lineage to other immigrants

Air Force Airman Jarrod M. Sealey

May 06, 2009 (USAFNS) -- Air Force Airman Jarrod M. Sealey graduated from basic military training at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas.

The airman completed an intensive, eight-week program that included training in military discipline and studies, Air Force core values, physical fitness, and basic warfare principles and skills.

Airmen who complete basic training earn four credits toward an associate in applied science degree through the Community College of the Air Force.

The airman is a 2007 graduate of Griffin High School.

June 02, 2009 (USAFNS) -- Army Pvt. Keith A. Sealy has graduated from basic combat training at Fort Jackson, Columbia, S.C.

During the nine weeks of training, the soldier studied the Army mission, history, tradition and core values, physical fitness, and received instruction and practice in basic combat skills, military weapons, chemical warfare and bayonet training, drill and ceremony, marching, rifle marksmanship, armed and unarmed combat, map reading, field tactics, military courtesy, military justice system, basic first aid, foot marches, and field training exercises.

He is the son of Belle Sealy of Union Grove Road, Sweet Water, Ala.

Sealy is a 2002 graduate of Sweet Water High School.

Navy Ensign Matthew D. Sealy

June 09, 2009 (USAFNS) -- Navy Ensign Matthew D. Sealy, son of Dave Sealy of Greenwood, S. C., recently graduated from the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., and was commissioned to his current rank in the United States Navy.

Sealy successfully completed four years of intensive academic, physical and professional training. The Naval Academy features a four-year, total-immersion program in which strong, balanced academics, are focused on educational needs of the Navy and Marine Corps, and superimposed on a strict, professional military training environment emphasizing the development of leadership skills.

Considered one of the top institutions in the country, the U.S. Naval Academy was founded in 1845. The Naval Academy has graduated more than 60, 000 men and women to include 4, 000 admirals and generals, one president, 200 members of Congress, three governors, 73 Medal of Honor recipients, one Nobel Prize winner and 40 astronauts.

The Naval Academy currently has more than 4, 000 students who comprise the Brigade of Midshipmen and come from every state in the union.

Nigel Sealy -- Mentor, Leader and 'Patriot' -- Retires from the Navy

GROTON, Conn. (NNS) -- The maintenance management officer of the regional support group (RSG) on Naval Submarine Base New London retired after 30 years of Naval service June 26.

Lt. Cmdr. Nigel Sealy, who was described as a patient mentor who changed the lives of Sailors, was honored at a ceremony held on base.

"Here is a man who was always ready to take another watch, always ready to lift a shipmate up with his hug and island-bright smile and always ready to bare a hand to get the mission done," said guest speaker Rear Adm. Arnold Lotring, commander, Naval Service Training Command.

In addition to his work at RSG, Sealy served four tours at the Naval Submarine School.

"More than a third of his career was devoted to mentoring and teaching our submariners," said Lotring, who Sealy worked with at the Navy Submarine School and Submarine Learning Center in Groton. "Imagine how he changed their lives. A real mentor and leader - there hasn't been many better that I have known."

"From challenging his leaders to pushing his people, he displayed an uncanny knack to motivate those around him," said Capt. Dave Hendricks, chief of staff for Submarine Group 2. "He is the primary reason that many of those around him were advanced in rate or selected to attend the service academy."

Sealy, a native of Port of Spain, Trinidad and Tobago, grew up in Matawan, New Jersey. After becoming a U.S. citizen, he enlisted in the Navy in August 1979. He then attended Basic Enlisted Submarine School in Groton. Sealy quickly moved up the ranks as an enlisted man, becoming a chief electronics technician in 10 years and served on several ships and submarines. Shore assignments included duty as an instructor at Basic Enlisted Submarine School.

He received his commission through the chief warrant officer program in August 1994, and then converted from a chief warrant officer 3 to a lieutenant junior grade under the limited duty officer program in October 1999.

Seeley Trail-Blazing Spirit Alive and Well Six Years after Serious Football Injury Logan Seelye Graduates College

EDITOR'S NOTE: The November 2003 and February 2004 issues of the SGS Newsletter contained articles reporting the progress of former SGS President Dan Seelye's grandson Logan Seelye who suffered a severe spinal cord injury that left him in a wheelchair.

"I think it made me realize how special and important loved ones are. I think it made me a lot more mature," Logan said in an article that ran in the Yakima Herald-Republic June 12.

The Herald-Republic article said, Logan, now 22, is engaged to be married, and has started his own Web design company with a buddy

He graduated from Central Washington University on June 13, with a bachelor's degree in information technology and administrative management. Nominated by one of his professors, Logan was the graduation ceremony's commencement speaker at the campus' main stadium, not far from where he was hurt.

"I had a chance to have lunch with him a couple of weeks ago and talk with him about what he was going to be saying to you today," said Central Washington University President James L. Gaudino as he introduced Logan. "It is arguably the most moving and inspirational conversation I have ever had."

Below is a transcript of Logan's speech which tells us a lot not only about this remarkable young man, but about the trail-blazing spirit of all Seeleys we'll honor at this year's reunion.

"Welcome to Central Washington University's 2009 east side graduation ceremony. My name is Logan Seelye and I will be your commencement speaker for this long awaited day but before I begin I would like to say congratulations to all of you. To the students, your families, and the professors: our self discipline and commitment have finally paid off.

"During my time at Central I have experienced a roller coaster of highs and lows, good times and challenging times and I'm sure all of you can relate. These experiences are just one chapter of our incredible book of life. But most of all the past four years have been a blast because I have made many new friends, making my chapter blessed with learning experiences and lifetime memories.

"I have had professors who truly are passionate about teaching and making a difference in our lives. These professors not only made the classroom an exciting venue that challenged us to ask why, but they also integrated projects and ideas that apply to the real world

"Let me share with you one of my most profound educational experiences while here at Central. My junior year I was required to take a leadership class. Going into it I was thinking to myself, 'Man is this going to be another boring class that might to put me to sleep?' But I

was in for an incredible surprise. We were asked to choose a leadership book to read followed later by an indepth report.

"For some of us like me, this isn't our favorite task. However, this book put things in place, making sense out of my educational opportunity, essentially. I was wrong about this class and this report. The book, The Twenty One Indispensable Qualities of a Leader by Dr. John C. Maxwell, explains the qualities found in leaders and how these qualities transcend into followers. Although all the qualities presented by Maxwell are powerful, the two that are most prominent during my studies and life in general are (1) self-discipline and (2) commitment.

"But first let me preface my perspective on these two qualities with my own personal story. As you all can see, I am in a wheel chair. But I have not always been in this chair. Six years ago on July 2, 2003, here at Central Washington University -- actually on these same football fields -- something happened that unexpectedly changed my life forever. I was participating in the annual Central-sponsored football camp with my high school football team. On the last day of camp during the second of three scheduled scrimmages, I made an amazing play on the field. I tackled the opposing team's wide receiver, forcing him to lose the ball, resulting in one my teammates intercepting it and running it back for a touch down.

"However, this where my story of leadership begins. While my coaches and teammates were cheering in excitement, I laid on the ground motionless. I broke my neck and suffered a spinal cord injury. I was awake, I was scared, and I was conscious, but it felt like my entire body was on fire. I was immediately taken to a local hospital, given a steroid shot in my spine to slow down the swelling, and then airlifted to Harborview Hospital in Seattle for immediate neck surgery. A week later, as I lay in a hospital bed, slowly regaining strength in nothing but my shoulders. I thought to myself, 'I can either complain and ask, 'why me,' or I can fight this situation and I can beat it!'

"It was at this very moment when I was beginning to ponder self discipline and commitment. As I was talking with one of the doctors, I asked him where my life would be going due to this injury. With a bold face he looked at me and said, "You will never be able to walk again or have feeling or movement from nipples down." As he walked away I was thinking to myself 'This guy must be crazy to think I would believe that.'

"From that point forward I have been committed to self discipline to prove him wrong. These two concepts self-discipline and commitment have played such an important role in my life and I believe they are important to all of us, not just leaders. I know many of you understand my story as you too have found yourselves in various degrees exercising self-discipline and commitment.

"Nowadays due to my rigorous and painstaking commitment and discipline, I'm able to walk with a

walker, drive my own car, and I work out five times a week. Yeah you can say I live a normal life but it is because I committed myself to doing so – walking again - just as you all have been committed and self-disciplined to graduate from Central Washington. And guess what? We all did it. This is why you're sitting here and celebrating with me today.

"Graduating from college is not a simple task for many of us. It takes a lot of commitment and self-discipline. But just like my leadership class and the book report, I knew I would get the job done; just like so many of my professors knew that I -- and we -- would get the job done through self-discipline and commitment. We've all come far in the past four years, but not because we were lucky, not because we took the easy way out, but because we worked hard and committed ourselves to doing something great: graduating from Central Washington.

"So let's celebrate! Be proud of yourself, be proud of what you've accomplished, but most of all be proud of the leader that you have all become while studying here at Central. You and I have earned this honor. Congratulations to the graduating class of 2009 at Central Washington University."

QUERY UPDATES:

Update to Query 0108-1 Re: Henry S Seeley

An 1885 marriage announcement for a daughter of Henry led the submitter, Paul Northrup Miller (millers@albany.net), to Henry's father William. An update in the February 2009 newsletter identified William, died 20 Aug 1878 age 75 yr, 4 mo, 20 days, buried Stanfordville, Dutchess, NY, as a probable son of Sylvanus Seeley Jr. b. Feb 1776, also buried Stanfordville.

This led to a written response from SGS member Barbara Hoyes of Arnold, MD. Barbara has a family bible of Timothy A Seeley, youngest son of Sylvanus Seeley Jr and his 2nd wife Ann Andrews. The bible records all the children of Sylvanus Jr, including William b. 31st Mar 1803. Barbara has done extensive research to try to identify this Sylvanus Jr. According to the family bible he was born 8 Jan 1776 in Ridgefield, Fairfield, CT. According to Barbara his parents are Sylvanus Seeley and Esther Hyatt and they had at least one other child. Esther divorced Sylvanus (Sr) due to abandonment in 1787 and went on to marry Abraham Pullen.

Sylvanus, father of Sylvanus Jr seems to be Sylvanus, "natural son" of Esther, wife of Daniel Stevens. Daniel Stevens became guardian of Sylvanus Seeley in 1772. it is unknown if Sylvanus is named for an unnamed Seeley father or if his mother Esther was a Seeley.

We would like to discover whether Esther is a Seeley or the name of Sylvanus Sr's father. Let me know if you would like to speak to Barbara directly – I have her address and telephone number. If we have any Seeley male who descends from Sylvanus Jr a DNA test would be very helpful.

Update to Query 0808-3 Re: Nehemiah Seeley

The original query was about Anna Seeley b. 1808 NY md 1826/27 Geauga Co. OH Hile Parker. The research uncovered several early Seeley marriages in Geauga County including that of Nehemiah Seeley to Rebecca Hawk 11 Mar 1827. Judy Seeley Price (JKSP1957@aol.com) has contacted us since she is descended from Nehemiah and Rebecca's son James b. 1828. Their other children are: Nancy Seeley Field b.1830, Mary W. Seeley Botzum b. 1831, Lorenzo b.1832, Clara/Clarissa Greenlese b.1833 and Harriet b.1844, all born Ohio. If anyone has information on Nehemiah's parents or siblings please contact me.

Update to Research Query 2009-B Re: Charles Seely b. 1818 CT

Researching some obituaries had led me back through the census to Charles and Caroline Seely of Baraboo, Sauk, WI in 1850. Now I have a response from Rita A. Seeley, an SGS Life Member. She writes that Charles Seely and Caroline Johnson Seely were her g-grandparents. Charles (b. 1818) and Caroline were

married March 20, 1836 in Newtown, Fairfield, CT. She has been trying to find their connection to the rest of the Seeley family, but has found nothing on their parents. Rita had her brother take the DNA test which connected him to Nathaniel, son of Robert Seeley. So, she has the Seeleys coming down and going up, but still can't make them meet in the middle! If anyone else is researching this branch of the Seeley family, Rita would love to hear from them. Her email is raseeley@centurytel.net.

Charlene is researching her family tree and sent a query about her great grandmother Anna Malora Seeley, born 24 Dec. 1872 in Erie County, Pa. Anna's parents as listed on her death certificate are Seeley, born in Pennsylvania, no first name, and Eunice Delaney Dougan. Anna died 13 Oct., 1942 in Ashtabula, Ohio. Eunice's mother was Rachel Davis, and her father was Charles Edward Dougan. Eunice married a man named Riley Staley in 1869; Charlene is not sure what happened to him but Eunice and Riley had a child named Robert Staley. Charlene has information that Eunice married a Seeley on the day that Anna was born (24 Dec. 1872). Her family history lists his first name as either Harvey or Warren. Also, Charlene's father and some older relatives have stated that Anna was at least 1/2 Native American. although she has found no proof of this. Anna's mother was Irish so the only Native American ancestry would have had to be from her Seeley father.

Charlene found an 1880 census in Erie, Pa, listing Anna and her 1/2 brother Robert living with their grandparents, Rachel & Charles Dougan. Eunice went on to marry John Brown in 1881 in Perry, Lake, Ohio.

SGS Response: There is no information on Anna nor her mother Eunice Dougan/Dugan in the database. The 1880 census that Charlene refers to is for Greenfield, Erie, PA. Robert Staley is 10 and Annie Seely is 7. In 1870 Riley Staley age 19 and Eunice age 20 are in North East, Erie, PA. He is a farm laborer. Also with them are Jane Staley age 45 and Henry age 9. I can't find Eunice in 1880.

Can anyone identify a possible father for Anna?

SGS Response: Whitesboro is a village in Oneida County, New York. The village is named after Hugh White, an early settler. The Village of Whitesboro is inside the Town of Whitestown.
