Tours Planned for Grand Rapids Reunion - 2013

Four wonderful tours have been arranged for reunion participants and it will be hard to pick which two to go with!

Permanent exhibits are the core of the Gerald R. Ford Presidential Library and Museum's program. They allow visitors to participate in history, not just view it, while reviewing the



highlights of the lives of President and Mrs. Ford. In addition to the permanent exhibits, a succession of temporary exhibits draw upon the rich holdings of the entire Presidential libraries system, the Smithsonian Institution, the National Archives, and others.

"Heritage Hill is а neighborhood in Grand Rapids and is one of the largest urban historic districts in the United States. Α number of architectural styles are included... These were the



homes of lumber barons, teachers, judges, and legislators who shaped the city's future. There is also a Prairie Style house designed by Frank Lloyd Wright which was built in 1908-09." "As a meticulous restoration complete with original furnishings and faithfully executed reproductions, the Meyer May house provides the rare opportunity to experience a Prairie house exactly as he intended.'

"There are many areas within the Frederik Meijer Gardens & Sculpture Park to explore including the indoor gardens such as the conservatory, tropical Victorian, carnivorous, and I



arid gardens, as well as the outdoor areas like the Children's Garden, Michigan's Farm Garden, seasonal gardens, a world-class Sculpture Park and meandering nature trails and boardwalk." We will have a docent led tour of the indoor area and a tram ride through the outdoor area! This group can take advantage of lunch in the Cafe.

The Grand Rapids Public Library, located in Grand Rapids, MI, was founded in 1871 and has a sizable local history collection and special collection section. supervisor, Tim Gleisner will conduct a tour


I grew up with Duke, and earned a B.A. there, later followed by degrees in Library Science and Education from other institutions.

My dear husband, H.A. Scott, and I in 55 years produced five children and nine grandchildren (followed since by two great-grands), all of whom are interesting individuals (none have become psychologist/teachers or librarians like H.A. and me). We lived in Rock Hill, S. C. for over 50 years.

When it was time for the oldest two to enter college, we needed extra income and I went back to my profession and became a high school librarian for 25 years. I have also been a county librarian and a college reference librarian.

I have been fortunate to be able to travel extensively, first with H.A. and later with other family members. Last November I visited my sixth continent – Australia. But I am not considering adding Antarctica!

SGS Reunion Speaker: Jack Dempsey, Author, Attorney at Law


Jack Dempsey is author of *Michigan and the Civil War: A Great and Bloody Sacrifice* (The History Press; Feb. 2011), and co-author of *Ink Trails: Michigan's Famous and Forgotten Authors* (MSU Press; Aug. 2012) . He is president of the Michigan Historical Commission and chairman of the Michigan History Foundation.

He is prominent in the Michigan Civil War community and runs a popular Michigan in the Civil War blog. He is also a member of the Historical Society of Michigan and a color bearer with the Civil War Preservation Trust.

"My fascination with the American Civil War dates from sometime around the 2nd or 3rd grade," says Dempsey's bio on the Michigan Civil War Blog. "I remember waiting for 'The Americans,' an NBC show about two brothers who fought for opposite sides in the [Civil War]. The first episode aired Jan. 23, 1961, when I was eight."

"When my fiancé and I were dating, eastern [Civil War] battlefields were a regular event. Once married, my bride and I toured them again--in order of occurrence," the bio says. "More recently I've come to realize that Michigan's key contributions to saving the Nation are not appropriately recognized or appreciated. This blog is part of an effort to rectify this error."

Born in Detroit, Mich., Dempsey graduated in 1974 from Michigan State University, James Madison College, with a B.A. that included a history minor. He received a J.D. degree from The George Washington University in 1977 and has practiced law ever since. Aside from three years in law school and three in Chicago at Winston &



Dempsey is a member the law firm of Dickinson Wrigh

at the law firm of Dickinson Wright PLLC in its Ann Arbor office. During 30+ years of practice, Dempsey successfully tried numerous contested case matters before federal and state public utility commissions.

Beginning in 1980 as an Assistant Attorney General for the State of Michigan, Jack served as first-chair litigator in hearings involving multi-million dollar issues. He assisted clients through the rulemaking process, including successful challenges on appeal. His experience earned him seats in national and state bar organizations devoted to the study and improvement of administrative law.

Proposed Changes to the SGS Constitution and By-Laws

George Seeley, Constitution and By-Laws Committee Chair

There are two issues that need to be addressed, and both require changes to the SGS governing documents. In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, changes will need to be approved by a three-fifths majority vote at the next reunion which occurs Aug. 8-11 in Grand Rapids, Mich. These proposed changes must be published in the newsletter a minimum of three months in advance of the vote.

In order to meet IRS requirements to file for non-profit tax exempt status, we must have a provision in our Constitution directing how assets will be distributed should the organization be dissolved. The general rule is that any remaining funds must be dispersed to a 501(c)(3) entity. This will be accomplished by adding a new ARTICLE VI.

The second issue is that there is a discrepancy between the wording in the Constitution and the By-Laws regarding the frequency of publication of the newsletter.

Below are listed the proposed changes. New text will be in bold format.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE II: Objectives

SECTION 2. Modify line 3, "for it's members and for posterity" to read for the education and benefit of its members and for posterity. This wording strengthens our position under the IRS definition as an educational entity.

ARTICLE VI: Disposition of Assets upon Dissolution

of the Seeley Genealogical Society


SECTION 1. At the time that dissolution of the Seeley Genealogical Society becomes necessary, all remaining assets shall be transferred to one or more entities that are involved in collecting, disseminating and archiving genealogical information and making such information available for general public use. The Board of Directors shall distribute such remaining assets to such entities with similar objectives as outlined in the SGS Constitution, provided that they meet IRS Section 501(c)(3) requirements.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE IV Duties of Appointed Officers

Replace SECTION 1 with a new SECTION 1 as follows:

The Publications Editor shall be responsible for the organization, printing and mailing of the Seeley Genealogical Society newsletter. In addition to the newsletter, the Publications Editor shall be responsible for the publishing of and/or providing oversight for other publications of the SGS. The newsletter shall include inquiries submitted to the SGS for general membership response. A close liaison must be maintained with the Membership Chair, Chief Genealogist and appointed associate editor(s) to perform these duties.

From the SRC Librarian: A Wrap-Up of an Archives Workshop

At the beginning of April, I attended a basic archives workshop in Topeka, Kan. This was presented by the Kansas State Historical Records Advisory Board in cooperation with the Kansas Historical Society and consisted of a two day seminar.

Even though some of the material was a bit above my head, I came away with a renewed outlook

regarding our archives that are stored in Abilene, Kan. One thing I realized is that we as an organization have never formalized our views regarding the Seelye Research Center as to what we want and don't want housed there. I think the upcoming reunion would be a good time to start the discussion.

As a member of SGS, what would you like to see in the collection at the SRC? Think about it and drop me an email before we go to Grand Rapids so I can gather your ideas together for discussion in the coming months.

One of the presentations given at the workshop concerned preservation and protection of your collection. The main idea behind this presentation is that no storage area is perfect and that you must do the best with what you've got. Two of things to try and control in your storage

area are humidity and temperature. You want to have an area with a humidity level around 30% and a temperature that doesn't fluctuate too much.

Sometimes you can't control how hot or cold an area is, but preventing temperature swings is much more effective at preserving your papers. You also want to try and keep items off of floors to help prevent mold and insect damage, and make sure you use the proper medium for storing your materials, avoiding items with PVC in them.

Last but not least, as reported in the last newsletter, make a disaster/emergency plan. The day most used by organizations for reviewing their plans is May 1st otherwise known as Mayday, why not adopt this for your planning day as well? An excellent resource for making your plan that was presented at the conference, is the Council of State Archivists booklet called "Rescuing Family Records" by David W. Carmicheal. In it you will find a checklist that covers things I never thought of when planning for an emergency. If you are interested, you can go to www.StateArchivists.org to order your own copy.

I can't believe we're almost ready for our reunion in Grand Rapids. I hope to see everyone there and I look forward to hearing about the types of plans you have come up with. Safe journeys to everyone and I'll see you in August.

Documenting SGS: The History of Our Family History

Several years ago, the Seeley Genealogical Society adopted an initiative to document what we do for record and historical purposes. The idea was to have available answers to questions like:

- 1. How many members did we have in (pick a year)?
- 2. Has the dues-paying membership increased or decreased since that time?
- 3. What was our financial condition in (pick a year)?
- 4. Has our financial condition improved?
- 5. What significant events happened in the past?
- 6. Who were the major players/volunteers in our Society?
- 7. What were our objectives and did we meet them?
- 8. How have we documented our family ancestral lines?
- 9. How have we made our Seeley data available to members and Seeley researchers?
- 10. What research has SGS funded and where do we find the results?
 - Currently we document SGS in the following ways:
- 1. The SGS Newsletter (published quarterly).
- 2. The Reunion Souvenir Book (published semi-annually).
- 3. The Seeley website at www.seeley-society.net (continuously updated and continuously available).

Some "Histories of SGS" have been written in the past and they are very interesting. However, they have some shortcomings: they covered only a few years of time and they didn't address financial or membership information among other significant topics.

I believe the three ways we are currently documenting SGS are sufficient if we do the following:

- Each SGS Reunion speaker provides the SGS President and SGS Publications Editor a typewritten copy of their speech or an outline of sufficient detail to permit the reader to understand their briefing objectives.
- Continue publishing a Reunion Souvenir Book with essentially the same content and format as
 - has been done in the past, but add more membership details and Society financial trend data.
- Continue making available on the SGS website copies of SGS Newsletters, SGS Reunion Souvenir Books, research reports, queries, DNA Project results, and data and information the webmaster decides to post.
- 4. Continue publishing a quarterly SGS Newsletter.

A more detailed version of this approach has been provided to SGS leadership. If there is agreement on this approach to documenting SGS, then I recommend any new efforts to write an SGS History be cancelled and past written histories be archived at the Seelye Research Center and on the Seeley website. The duties of the SGS Historian should then be to ensure the approach to documenting SGS, as approved by the Executive Board, is continuously and vigorously implemented.

Historic Societies and Other Groups Offer Great Networking Opportunities

If you are a descendant of Robert Seeley, here are two lineage societies which might interest you:

1. The Winthrop Society, Descendants of the Great Migration, 1630-1635

Winthrop Society is not those Separatists who founded Plimoth Plantation in 1620 (that's my wife's folks); it is the Puritans who settled Boston in 1630, just Johnnies-come-Lately, she says. Robert came in the original Winthrop Fleet. They have a growing archive of research. Much more information is on their website, http://www.winthropsociety.com.

When I joined Winthrop Society, I took advantage of established research and saved the Winthrop Registrar a lot of time by using the SGS CD (http://www.seeleysociety.net/seeleybook.html) containing the research done by Kathie Olsen, Madeline Mills et al. I sent a copy of the CD with my application, printouts of the pages from the CD showing my descent from Robert to Seth Seelye (SGS #2056, listed on the CD), plus documentation linking me to Seth. If you wish to join, I suggest that you use the same technique of tracing your descent on the SGS CD to a Robert descendant listed on the SGS CD, then documenting your link to that descendant, and then referring the Winthrop Registrar to the CD used in Walt Seelye's application, Member #10818.

SGS Member Judge Richard L. Speer, 71, Aug. 14, 1941 - April 3, 2013

The Honorable Richard L. Speer, Judge of the United States Bankruptcy Court, Northern District of Ohio, died Wednesday, April 3, 2013 at Mercy St. Vincent Medical Center, Toledo, Ohio. He was born in Norwalk, Ohio on and resided in Port Clinton. Ohio. Judge Speer, an active member of SGS, was a 14th generation

descendant of Robert Seeley (1602-1667). His line is: Richard Lyle Speer, Lyle Lafallette Speer, Steve Speer, Ida May Codding, Marietta Arabell Seeley, Jesse, David, Jesse, Samuel, Nathaniel, Nathaniel, Nathaniel, Nathaniel, Robert

Judge Speer was the 2nd longest serving judge in the United States, including the U.S. Supreme Court, having been appointed to the bench in 1975 and overseeing 114. 464 cases. A longtime resident of Port Clinton, Ohio, Judge Speer was a native of Norwalk, Ohio. He was born on August 14, 1941, a son of Lyle & Ruth (Gredys) Speer. On November 9, 1968, he married the former Anita Gailitis.

Judge Speer was a graduate of Ohio Northern University with a bachelor of education degree from the College of Liberal Arts and a Juris Doctor degree from the College of Law. Before being named to his present position, he was a high school teacher in Castalia, Ohio, an assistant attorney general for the State of Ohio, a lawyer in general practice with Reinheimer & Reinheimer, Port Clinton, and Rosentreter, Zeitzheim, & Speer, Oak Harbor, Ohio. Judge Speer was also an instructor of real estate law at Terra Community College, Fremont, Ohio, and in 1978, he received the Outstanding Real Estate Instructor Award.

Active and well known in Masonic circles, Judge Speer received his 33rd degree in 1985, which is the highest honor in Scottish Rite Masonry. He joined Masonry in Ada Lodge, F. & A.M., and later transferred to Oliver H. Perry Lodge, #341, F. & A.M., Port Clinton, where he served as Worshipful Master. He was a Past High Priest of the former Lake Erie Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, Port Clinton, and a member of Sandusky City Chapter, R.A.M; Past Illustrious Master of the former Gibraltar Council, Royal & Select Masons, and a member of Sandusky City Council, R. & S.M. Judge Speer was a Past Commander of Erie Commandery #23, Knights Templar, Sandusky, Ohio. He has received the Knight of the York Cross of Honour distinction. Joining the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley of Toledo in 1969, Judge Speer served as Scottish Rite Ambassador to his Lodge for several years. He is also a Past Sovereign Master of Portage Council, Allied Masonic Degrees, and a member of the Key to the Sea Council. He was a member of Zenobia Shrine, Toledo; the North Central Forest of the Tall Cedars of Lebanon: Port Clinton Chapter #267, Order of the Eastern Star; and Singara Grotto, Sandusky. He was awarded the Order of the Purple Cross and the DeMolay Legion of Honour.

A voracious reader, Judge Speer had a keen interest in Civil War and World War II history, and genealogy. Known for his strong character and his acerbic, dry humor, Judge Speer possessed an amusing quirkiness that endeared him to his friends and family. He had a brilliant mind and was known for his "Speerisms".

A man of many interests and passions, Judge Speer always placed his family first. He is survived by his wife of over 44 years, Anita Speer; children, Gretchen (Frank) Sivinski, Norwalk, Ohio, and Richard (Leslie) Speer, Jr., Toledo, Ohio; grandchildren, Nicholas, Steven, Jillian, Alexander, Zachary, and Kyle; sisters, Leslie (Gale) Wiswell, Castalia, Ohio, and Deborah Speer, Toledo; brother, William (Kathy) Speer, Akron, Ohio; one nephew and thee nieces. He was preceded in death by his parents.

Commandery services were held at Neidecker, LeVeck & Crosser Funeral Home in Port Clinton Sunday April 7. Private family services were held April 9, with interment in the Masonic Garden of Meadow Green Memorial Park, Huron, Ohio. Update to Query 0605-5 Re Samuel Seelye b. b. 6 Aug 1778, VT, d. 27 Apr 1854, Greenup, KY

Samuel married, in Whitehall, Washington, NY in 1802, Electa Fuller, b. 19 Jun 1783 or 1785, d. 14 Apr 1871, OH. Jean Seeley (djseeley@adelphia.net), the original submitter wanted to know the parentage of

Samuel and Electa. DNA analysis of a descendant showed that Samuel is in the Robert, Nathaniel line.

Since the last newsletter I have exchanged several emails with Beverly Dennis (msde140@bellsouth.net). She has been trying to establish a connection between this Samuel and Benjamin Seeley, a Rev. War patriot. Beverly believes that Samuel is a son of Nathaniel Seelye, SGS# 272 who is a son of Benjamin and husband of Lucy Graves. SGS only lists one son for Nathaniel: John Seelye b. abt 1771 New Fairfield CT.

Beverly has put together the following analysis: Family tradition has it that Samuel Seeley is the son of Nathaniel Seeley and Lucy Graves Seeley. Samuel lists his birth-place as Vermont in 1778. (1850 Census, KY Death Register) This analysis establishes the presence of the Nathaniel Seeley (married to Lucy Graves), son of Benjamin Seeley), in Vermont at the time of Samuel's birth. Due to the fire of the Statehouse (where records were kept) in Vermont in 1857, most of the Vermont vital and land records were destroyed. This disaster has made the following analysis necessary. Extensive research through Vermont records that are available suggest the following:

- Nathaniel/Nathan Seeley was a Captain in the Vermont militia in Vermont during the Revolutionary War. He served under Samuel Herrick and a Col. Bates. (See pay cards for Vermont Militia and the book edited by Fisher and Fisher, Soldiers, Sailors and Patriots of the Revolutionary War in Vermont, p.464.) He is listed as a Freeman in the Boston Evening Transcript, 1910, ed. by William Bradford Brown, "List of Freemen of Pownal." This Nathaniel is in Vermont at the time Samuel is born.
- During the Revolutionary War, there are no other Nathaniel Seeleys located in Vermont. In this branch (Captain Robert >Nathaniel >Benjamin >John> Benjamin) for several generations, there is a naming tradition that accounts for several other Nathaniel Seeleys. (This number added to the Vital information missing from Vermont, has resulted in a great deal of confusion.) These Nathaniel Seeleys remain in Connecticut and New York during the Revolutionary War.
- Samuel's father, Nathaniel, first appears in Vermont as early as 1766. He is in Pownal as early as 1773 (Pownal List of Freemen) and listed in the Vermont 1771 census as having applied for a parcel of land in petition #17 for himself (VT 1771 Census, p.76) in 1766. Right above his name is the name of his father, Benjamin in petition #18. Benjamin has purchased land in New York with his brother Ebenezer Seeley. Ebenezer is later recorded as selling his claim to New York land (History of Glens Falls, p.105) and appears in Vermont with Nathaniel (Pownal, by Joseph Parks), possibly in Benjamin's place. Nathaniel marries Lucy Graves in East Haddam, CT. in 1770. Transcription of Will of Jedidiah Graves, New Milford Pro-bate records #1070, (Lucy's father) lists heirs and marriage of Lucy to Nathaniel. Graves is a partner with Benjamin Seeley in the New York Land acquisition (History of Glens

- Falls, p.54). East Haddam is where Ebenezer's wife, Hannah Hungerford was born. (http://www.seeleysociety.net/nathaniel/sgs101.html)
- History of Greenup County, Ky. (by Nina Mitchell Biggs and Mabel Lee Mackroy, 1951: p.181) links Samuel to Nathaniel by naming Lucy Graves, wife of Nathaniel in the publication, that speaks of the Seeley Family connection to the Hill family. (Ruby Seeley, daughter of Samuel and Electa marries John Hill; see U.S. Census 1860). It is believed that Ruby was named for Ruby Morehouse, wife of Samuel's brother, John (SGS#779), who may have been murdered in 1797. (See Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) #29485 for Sanford Williams French, Lucy and Nathaniel are referenced as well as Ruby and John.)
- Further links between Samuel and Nathaniel are established by petitions for land by Nathaniel after the war (1780's) in Pownal, and Pultney, and around Skenesbrough (later Whitehall, NY). Samuel marries Electa Fuller in Whitehall, NY (recorded in family tree1802). Samuel Seeley's first 2 children (Amos and Amanda) list New York as their birthplace. Samuel is in the 1810 US census for Washington Co, New York. Curiously, the name of Samuel Herrick is also in that 1810 census. Samuel Herrick was the Colonel that Nathaniel Seeley served under in Vermont during the Revolutionary War, and might possibly account for the naming of Samuel, although Samuel does appear in other Seeley family branches. Tracing Samuel from New York to Kentucky, both younger daughters (Electa and Ruby) list Pennsyl-vania as birthplace in the 1850 US Census. The birthplace for the daughters as well as the residence for Samuel is mentioned in the History of Greenup County.
- In conclusion, the locations of Samuel Seeley coincide with the land records and census records of family movements and residences of Nathaniel Seeley which support the relationship between Samuel and Nathaniel. The preponderance of evidence of family connections in Pownal, VT, Whitehall, NY and Greenup Co. KY support the link between Samuel Seeley and his father and mother, Nathaniel and Lucy Graves Seeley.

Beverly says that Nathaniel Seelye also had a daughter Lucy who married Henry Billings and moved to Vicksburg, Mississippi. Lucy then married a Mr. Weed (possibly) She wonders if anyone has information on Lucy? Beverly also wonders about Lucy Graves Seeley - did she remarry? If you can corroborate or add to any of this information please let us know.

She found the probate and will of Edward Harger Jr, son of Edward Harger and Susanna Dickenson. William L Harger of Colesville, Broome, NY is listed as a son. Further information indicates that his wife was Jane Covert. Edward Harger Jr's 1st wife, mother of his children, is Catherine L, possibly Catherine Leek, with Leek also a possibility as William L's middle name. Another child of Edward Harger Jr is Sarah/Sally A Harger b. 1830 in Ovid. She married William Pease Seeley, son of John Beardsley Seeley, SGS# 1961 as his 2nd wife in 1857.

So, Seeley Harger b. 1850, d. 1927 is a son of William L Harger, who is a son of Edward Harger Jr. Edward Harger Jr is a brother of Nancy Harger who md John Beardsley Seeley, SGS# 1961. John Beardley Seeley's sister Arvilla, SGS# 1969 md Seeley Harger, son of Mary/Polly Seeley (SGS# 1974). Her husband Eber Harger is a brother of Edward Harger Jr, and Nancy Harger.

If you are confused by now (!) you probably don't want to know that John Beardsley Seeley also had a brother, William Pease Seeley, SGS# 1963, who married a Sally Harger in 1810. This Sally Harger married Peter Covert in 1821, after William died, and then she died in 1825.

Here is another obituary that led to a brick wall. This time Chris started with an obit for James Seeley b. 14 Jan 1924 in Lodi, San Joaquin, CA, died 2013 Eugene, Lane, OR. James was a son of Milton and Julia Fielding Seeley. Milton was born in Utah and spent his life on the west coast. According to the 1900 census of Los Angeles CA his father was William J Seeley b. March 1854 in NY state to parents b. NY State. In 1900 William J was married 12 years to his wife Kate b. May 1869 in NY state to parents b. in NY. According to CA death records Kate's maiden name was McDonald. In 1910 William J and Kate Seeley are in Fresno, CA. Kate has the 3 youngest children with her and William J is listed separately.
