Standing and Ad Hoc Committees of SGS

I thank Paul Taylor for his suggestion that I write an article on the large number of Seeley Genealogical Society's committees. I think it might be interesting for SGS members to know what committees we have, what their purposes are, and who the members of various committees are. I welcome volunteers who would like to be involved in these committees.

Our constitution and by-laws outline the place of committees in the Seeley Genealogical Society. There are three sections in the by-laws Article V: Committees. Section 1 states, "The President shall appoint necessary standing and ad hoc committees and require reports from them." Article III: Duties of Elected Officers, Section 1 states, "The President... shall be a member of all committees except the nominating and auditing committees.... The President shall serve as the chairperson of the committee to organize the membership meeting conducted per Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution."

Ad hoc committees are set up with a purpose and end when that purpose is met. The by-laws mention two ad hoc committees:

Article V: Section 2 states, "Nominating Committee: The President shall appoint a nominating committee of at least two (2) members one year in advance of the national reunion. The Nominating Committee shall ascertain that all candidates nominated will be willing to serve if elected." Linda Crocker chaired this committee with Marshall Seelye and Camille Seeley Bell as members for the 2013 election. At the conclusion of the membership meeting, this committee disbanded.

Article V: Section 3 states, "Auditing Committee: The President shall appoint an auditing committee of not less than two (2) members to examine the financial records of the Society, once every two years, or oftener if required by the Executive Board. The results will be presented to the membership in attendance at each reunion, and submitted in writing for publishing in the newsletter." Lynda Simmons and Lou Ann Crisler served on this committee for the 2013 reunion. The committee found the Treasurer's books to be organized, accurate, and orderly. Its report was published as part of the minutes of the Membership Meeting in the November, 2013 newsletter. This committee also disbanded at the conclusion of the membership meeting.

Another ad hoc committee is the Reunion Committee which is assembled for the purpose of arranging the

upcoming reunion. The 2013 reunion committee did a great job! I chaired the committee with Bill Hileman, Marion Hileman, Sue Ann Craven, Roeberta Shingledecker, and Linda Crocker. This committee disbanded at the conclusion of the reunion.

A great group has volunteered to serve as the 2015 Reunion Committee. I will again chair. Members include Terry Tietjens, Jesse Crisler, Lou Ann Crisler, Jim Seeley, Linda Crocker, Chris Havnar, Camille Seeley Bell, Ivey Harris, Ruthetta Hansen, Sue Ann Craven, Thera Seeley Clark, Walt Seelye, and Marie Seelye. We will hold a planning meeting in Abilene, Kan., on

Thursday, July 17, 2014, at 1:00 p.m. Please let me know if you would like to be part of this effort.

Another ad hoc committee is the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, chaired by George Seeley with Jim Seeley, Linda Crocker, Mary Palley, Richard Speer (deceased) and me as members. This committee proposed changes to the constitution and by-laws. These proposed changes were published in the newsletter and voted on by SGS members at the reunion. This committee disbanded at the conclusion of the membership meeting. A new constitution committee needs to be assembled for the 2015 reunion. If you are willing to serve, please contact me.

Finally, the SGS Research Committee, formed at the 2013-2015 Executive Board Meeting held in Grand Rapids, will determine and prioritize the research goals for 2013-2015. The committee consists of Walt Seelye, Jim Seeley,

Besides ad hoc committees, SGS maintains many standing committees. I sincerely appreciate all who currently serve. I would welcome anyone else who volunteers to join any of these committees. The below list is alphabetical.

The Ancestor File Committee consists of Linda Crocker and Chris Havnar. They are "responsible for maintaining a computerized database of all ancestor files submitted by members of the Society" (Section 2 of the by-laws ARTICLE IV: Duties of Appointed Officers). In addition they regularly update the Ancestor File with information gathered from obituaries, vital records, queries, and other research. Linda also serves as the query editor of the newsletter and in this capacity, she responds to inquiries to the Society by members and non-members discovering or verifying information on their Seeley ancestors and connects them to established SGS lineages. Any new information uncovered is added to the Ancestor File.

The Awards and Recognition Committee is chaired by Jim Seeley with Marshall Seelye and me as members. This committee identifies opportunities for members to be recognized by SGS and other organizations. Mary Flynn Palley and Marshall Seelye were recognized as outgoing officers for their service to SGS. Chris and Jerry Havnar were recognized for their many contributions to SGS as recipients of the first biennial Outstanding SGS Volunteer Award. The SGS newsletter with Paul Taylor as Editor was awarded an Honorable Mention by the National Genealogical Society.

The DNA Lineage Project Committee chaired by Walt Seelye, continues the project of organizing findings connected with DNA testing.

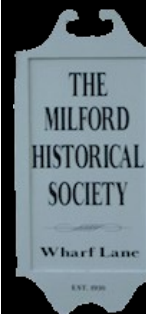

Nathaniel vs. Obadiah DNA

Deoxyribonucleic Acid (DNA) is the latest tool for tracing your family tree. With a cheek swab you can verify your lineage for generations back or discover a challenging new direction for research.

The Seeley Genealogical Society had documented Nathaniel as the son of Robert Seeley of the 1630 Winthrop Fleet, but Obadiah was only suggested to be a second son. We discovered through DNA that Obadiah is not Robert's son; Robert and Obadiah are not related for farther back than we can determine. So Obadiah's descendants now must determine how he came to America.

Various types of DNA analysis, available for different purposes, might assist in this effort. At the moment, SGS is narrowly focused on a 37-marker Y-DNA analysis. The Y chromosome is passed unchanged (except for random mutations) from father to son, while other chromosomes are a recombination of father's and mother's chromosomes. Thus we look only at Seeley-surname males for this analysis.

These 37 positions (out of thousands) on the Y chromosome are so-termed non-coding DNA (formerly called "junk DNA"). They do not contribute to any gene, we do not know what they do. But they can be used to trace lineage, since over the course of a dozen generations, very few random mutations occur. (The average is 1 change in 500 generations.)

Incidentally, these 37 positions (markers) have nothing to do with the DNA tests in criminal investigations. In the lab your swab is assigned a number, and the technicians don't know your identity. (Lineage DNA analysis typically takes 4-6 weeks, unlike TV where the results come within

the and hour's program!)

DNA is made from various combinations of four nucleotide bases (building blocks), labelled A, C, G, & T for short. The lab examines the specific markers listed for repeating patterns within the marker, such as GATAGATA or CTGCTGCTG, etc, called Short Tandem Repeats (STRs). Differences in the number of STRs separate the Seeleys from the Joneses, for example. Because DNA genealogy is so new, various labs choose different markers for analysis; thus Family Tree DNA lab's 37-marker Y-DNA test can be compared with only 26 markers of the Nathaniel standard. A small change in one or two markers is considered normal over a 12-generation span. By comparison, Nathaniel and Obadiah differ in 13 markers, which puts their common ancestor long before people had surnames.

How can we use DNA analysis? DNA can confirm or deny what your paper trail tells you, as far as your general descent is concerned. It can guide the direction of your research. For example, it can tell you that you share a common ancestor with "cousin" Bob, but it cannot tell you precisely how you connect. It can reinforce your lineage but not show the details that paper documentation can. Still, by showing an unexpected link, it can open a new area of investigation.

As more DNA analyses come in from Seeleys, we are finding a number of cousins who, according to DNA, are neither Nathaniel nor Obadiah descendants, raising opportunities and questions that progress in DNA research, coupled with additional hard work getting paper documentation, may answer.



Seelye Research Center Update

In the past year I have been stressing the importance of protecting the information that you store on your computer. Now I want to let you know that doing a "back-up" may not be enough. The always looming possibility of a computer crash became a reality for me last month when my computer refused to boot up. My first reaction cannot be printed, and my second reaction was "that's okay, because I've got my backups." After finding a computer that ran Windows 7 and getting it set up. However, I realized that my backup was not going to do me any good because the backup program copied everything exactly, including the operating programs, as it was on my old computer and placed it very conveniently into a restore file. I soon found out that XP and Windows 7 cannot talk to each other so you cannot hook up that drive with your backup and select restore. I then thought, "Okay, I'll probably lose my photos and personal documents, but the

SGS files are also on a thumb drive so I've still got those (sigh of relief)." 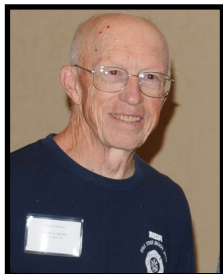

Military Times Hall of Valor Features Seeley Marine from Korean War

Maj. Henry W. Seeley, Jr.

United States Marine Corps

1st Marine Division (Rein.)

Motor Transport Officer

Place of Birth: Washington, Conn.

Silver Star

Awarded for actions during the Korean War

Action Date: December 2, 1950



Award Citation: "The President of the United States of America takes pleasure in presenting the Silver Star to Major Henry W. Seeley, Jr. (MCSN: 0-7315), United States Marine Corps, for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity as Motor Transport Officer of the FIRST Marine Division (Reinforced), in action against enemy aggressor forces in Korea on 2 December 1950. When his convoy was attacked and surrounded by numerically superior hostile forces while proceeding from Koto-ri to Hagaru-ri, Major Seeley boldly refused the enemy's demand to surrender and quickly reorganized friendly Marine and Army elements in a determined effort to fight a way out of the ambush. Although continually exposed to hostile fire throughout the ensuing action, he bravely led his men in inflicting heavy casualties upon the enemy and, skillfully directing the tactical movement of the convoy, succeeded in leading his unit out of the trap. By his marked courage, aggressive fighting spirit and unswerving devotion to duty, Major Seeley served to inspire all who observed him and upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Query Updates

Update to Query 1311-1 Re George Seeley, b. 1871 OH

George's great-granddaughter, Karen Hart (karen-hart@torchlake.com), was trying to identify his parents. We found his probable parents George and Bridget Cely in the 1870 census of Berea, OH, with his older sister Ann, age 1, and older children Joseph and Mary Flanagan, ages 9 and 8, but could not find them in the 1880 census.

Karen recently heard from a relative that Bridget Jane Kelly, (the wife of George Cely/Seeley) was married to John Flanagan/Flannagan and lived in Ohio at that time. She found a census record from 1860 in Pultney Twp, Belmont, OH, showing where a John Flanagan and a Bridget Kelly were in the household of Dennis Hays. She also found an Ohio marriage record from Cuyahoga Co., OH, dated Nov. 21, 1858 for John Flannegan and Bridget Kelley.

I searched for Joseph Flanagan and found this:

1860 census (Berea P.O.), Middleburg, Cuyahoga, OH

- Flannagan, John, age 25, b. IRE, laborer
 - Flannagan, Bridget, age 25, b. IRE
 - Flannagan, Joseph, age 6 mos., b. OH
- They are listed directly after Thomas Kelley age 30 and wife Jane age 23, both b. IRE.

Karen's father recalls hearing of a "step-brother" to his grandfather George William Seeley (this George was born in 1871 in Elyria, OH) but the step-brother had moved and was living in Tulsa, OK. Possibly this would be Joseph Flanagan. Her dad also believes that there was a step-sister of this same grandfather (possibly, Mary Flanagan) who lived in the Chicago area.

If you have any more information on these Cely/Seeleys or Flanigans, we would love to hear from you.

New Queries

Query 1402-1 Submitted by Carol Manley (manleycj@netwitz.net)

Carol has just started to work on her family tree and has found conflicting information on the parents of her great-grandfather, Harmon P. Seely, b. 11 Oct. 1844, Rome, WI, d. 11 Jan. 1941, Centralia, IL. One source lists John D. Seely as his father and Almira (Stewart) Seely as his mother, but another source lists Elijah Davis as his father and Almira as his mother. Carol turned to SGS for help.

SGS Response: The SGS Ancestor File lists the parents of Harmon P. Seely as Elijah Davis Seely and Almira Swert and shows him marrying Henrietta Norman in 1876 in Cherokee Co., IA. The sources listed include the IGI, the census and an obituary.

Harmon Seely Dies In Illinois

Word was received last week of the death of Harmon P. Seely on Jan. 11 at Centralia, Ill where he has been living since 1929. Mr. Seely was a Civil War veteran and had lived in Crook County some time. He was the father of John D. Seely of the Seely community.

*Harmon P. Seely was born at Rome, Wisconsin on October 88, 1884** and lacked only a few years of reaching the century mark. He was the son of E.D. and Elmira Seely. When about the age of 16 he moved to Iowa with his parents and enlisted as a private in Co. D. 16th Iowa Volunteers known as Crocker's Iowa Brigade.*

Mr. Seely, always known as Dad, fought in the historic battle of Shiloh and a short time later was taken prisoner at luka, Miss. Months when he was exchanged for a southern soldier held in a Union camp. He stood in the front lines at Atlanta and Nashville and fought in the siege of Vicksburg. He was married to Henrietta Norman on March 4, 1876 from which union four children were born, one girl died at two years and one son, B.E. died in May, 1911. A son, H.N. lives at Centralia where the deceased has been the last 12 years, and John D., the remaining son, lives at Seely.

Harmon Seely lived in Iowa on a farm for some years and in 1905 moved to Miller, S.D. where he followed the carpenter trade until Jan. 1910 when he moved to Crook county in the vicinity now known as Seely. He remained here until 1929 when he moved to Centralia. His wife preceded him in death, having died July 4, 1937.

In addition to his sons, he is survived by four grandsons, three granddaughters and six great grandchildren.

Published in the Crook County News, (Wyoming), January 31, 1941 front page

**** Date of Birth incorrect as printed.** The 1900 Census shows October 1844.

Harmon P. is the son of SGS # 3449: Harmon P.; Elijah Davis (# 3449); Daniel (# 1554); David; Charles; Samuel; Jonas; Obadiah.

There's an Illinois death record that lists Harmon's father as John D., but that is his son. That's not surprising, I often see incorrect information on death certificates. Sometimes informants do not know that it asks for the father of the deceased and put the names of their own fathers, or the transcribers put the informant's name where the father's name should go.

It says Elijah's wife was Almira Frink. The children include Harmon, who is listed as Harrison. I would guess that whoever wrote the book couldn't read their notes and mis-read his name.

Irvin W. Seeley is the grandfather of Joseph's wife but apparently he was born with a different name, Irvin Fuller in 1905 in PA. Irvin died in 1993. He was reared by Andrew A. and Sarah Jane Seeley. Irvin's wife was Annabel P. Seeley (1911-1994). Joseph really hopes to find some information on Irvin's biological parents. His mother-in-law said that her father (Irvin Seeley) had a half-sister (same father) named Beatrice Fuller (who his wife remembers visiting as a child) and that their father's name was Joseph Fuller. She vaguely remembers someone saying that Sarah Jane was Irvin's biological mother and that Andrew adopted him.

SGS Response: I found a transcript of Irvin and Anna's marriage in Corning, NY on Rootsweb: Marriage License #434 was issued in Corning, NY, by town clerk, G. Merle Hunt, to William Irvin? Seely, of RFD#1, Corning, NY, and Anna Bell (Annabelle) Peterson of RFD#1, Corning, NY. Groom info: white, age 22, b. PA, s/o Andrew Peterson? and Sara Fuller, both b. US, first marriage.

Information on bride: w, age 17, b. Big Flats, NY, d/o Justin Peterson, b. US, and Myra Aker or Oker, b. US. The couple was married on 14 November 1927 in Corning, Steuben, NY, by George S.G. Haus?, clergyman, witnessed by Raymond T. Coon, of Campbell, NY, and Marion A. Peterson of Coopers Plains, NY.

I find it difficult to believe that Sarah Jane, married to Andrew A. Seeley since 1872, suddenly had two children (Irvin and his sister Beatrice) out-of-wedlock while in her 50s and then Andrew adopted at least one of them. It seems more likely that Irvin is a grandson like Wallace (and possibly Eddie Niles/Edward Seeley) or some other relative or is not related by blood at all. It would help to find obituaries for some of these folks, birth records, etc.

If you recognize this family or can do some research in Steuben Co., NY, or Wayne Co., PA, please send us your information.

Query 1402-3 Submitted by Chris Havnar (chris.havnar@gmail.com)

A recent obituary posted by SGS Webmaster Chris Havnar on the SGS website (www.seeley-society.net) for Eileen Conger Seeley (1922-2014) mentioned that she was survived by her husband of 68 years, James E Seeley Jr.

Chris dug a little deeper looking at public records on Ancestry.com, where she found James and Eileen together in Rocky Mount, NC (Eileen's place of death) and James' birth date of 15 Dec. 1921. There was no information about parents or place of birth for James or Eileen in the obituary. That left her wondering, "Who is this James E Seeley Jr.?"

We will publish an update to your query with any new information we receive. This may lead to even more information. One more name, date or place may be the key to linking your line to another.

Your query will also be posted on our website. Make sure we have your current contact details. Sometimes we get new information months or even years after your query appears.

If you have information to share on queries from current or past issues, send it to the query submitter and also to Linda Crocker, Query Editor. **Please include the Query number**, preferably in the subject line of your email. Remember to cite your sources.
